Chairman Elect's Column 2004-2005 Business of the House

Are we close to recovery after April's convention and annual meeting; caught up on all of the deferred obligations and devising ways to implement all those stimulating ideas which we recognized in meetings and presentations? Particularly as host society, the Annual meeting is a flurry of preparation, preparation, and preparation, with relief at the closing. We had an excellent attendance at the House meeting seating 187 members, and resolved our business in short order. I'm consistently in awe at the wisdom of free elections and votes. Thank you for your presence, and for your direction.

Between now as I write this, and next month as you read this, I will have flanged up the roster committee members to do the work of the house over the next year. I have made a concerted effort to provide for broad geographic representation within these committee appointments, as far as I am allowed. Thanks for volunteering, and for agreeing to serve.

Remembering that our organization is and should be dynamic, and that the House as its legislative arm is both responsive to membership and progressive, previews of the issues we will be considering are cited.

The **Constitution and Bylaws Committee** will be asked to consider the following items:

- Filling vacancies: though this is a very unlikely event, prior preparation provides for a smoother transition. Currently, a Presidential vacancy is filled by the Vice-President as per By Laws Article II, Section 3. In Section 11, Vacancies, if the office of President-Elect becomes vacant, it is filled by a special election called by the EC – with no specifications or guidance on how to name candidates. All other officer vacancies filled by appointment of the EC. The C&BL committee will prepare a model for equitable and transparent succession. Thanks are due to Tom Ewing for his founding analysis of this issue which will be evaluated in committee.
- Student sponsors: as it currently stands, student and associate members are not required to provide a sponsor with their application for membership, although successful students advance to associate membership until they have completed the requisite experience for active membership. The committee will be studying the desirability of requiring a faculty member or AAPG member is good standing sponsor these applicants.
- Instant Run-off Voting: our C&BL provide for election by a plurality of votes (Article II, Section 10) which is

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likely intent (as pointed out to me by Don Lewis). Also, in cases of more than 2 candidates several methods exist which provide for an equitable election, such as Instant Run-off Voting which has been introduced in the AC for selection of Honors & Awards recipients. In researching this subject, I learned that many countries where there are more than two political parties use this system, including Australia where it was introduced in 1920. We should also be sensitive to Condorcet's Paradox which points out that it is possible that a majority prefers option A over option B, a majority prefers option B over option C, and yet a majority prefers option C over option A. (Thus, majority prefers is not transitive.) The C&BL will be asked to research and develop a methodology for voting in multi-candidate elections.

- Unfinished business: The house referred back to the C&BL, the rewording of the C&BL, to provide for reinstatement to membership of a prior member who was expelled for ethical reasons, by unanimous vote of the Executive Committee, thus providing consistency between Article I, Section 12, and Article XI, Sections 7 and 8.

The **Resolutions Committee** will be asked to seek out and invite affiliation and association with qualifying societies which are not currently affiliated with the AAPG in an aggressively proactive manner, in keeping with our strategic plan to become the premier Association of choice for the petroleum geologists.

The **Ad Hoc Committee on Advisory Council Representation** presented their interim report at the meeting of the House in Dallas, and their final report herein. This committee is a hold-over from last year, and will be finishing up and making recommendations for implementation.

I have asked John Hogg to chair the newly commissioned **Ad Hoc Committee on Executive Session**. Although the C&BL committee reviewed this issue in committee during 2002-2003 and declined to propose any change prohibiting any AAPG body from invoking executive session during the consideration of Nominations and/or Honors and Awards, a fresh look and new perspective is reasonable.

What's left? Why don't you tell me? I sincerely solicit your opinions on all of the above issues, and any others which

Constitution and Bylaws Committee

The revisions to the Bylaws were completed in timely fashion at the annual meeting, thanks to the well prepared Delegates. There were five proposed amendments to the Association's Bylaws:

- 1) Deletion of the classification, requirements and dues for Junior membership.
- 2) Amending the requirement for sponsors for Active membership from three members in good standing to **three individuals, at least two of whom are members in good standing**.
- 3) Change in reinstatement procedure
- 4) Deletion of the mail notice of Executive Committee meetings
- 5) Change in maximum dues amounts and certain provisions concerning Student membership

All amendments passed with the exception of 3, which was tabled. Confusion about this book keeping amendment resulted from miscommunication between myself and the Chairman. We were following different scripts and acoustics were poor on the podium. I say book keeping because Article I, Section 9, of the Bylaws clearly prohibits the EC from reinstating a member who has been expelled for ethical reasons. Article XI, Section 7 allows the EC, by unanimous vote, to reinstate a member expelled for ethical reasons. Section 8 of this article, last paragraph, says the same thing. For the sake of consistency, this amendment needs to be included in next year's agenda.

Considerable discussion was centered on amendment 2. An amendment to this proposal requiring the third individual to be a professional geologist was narrowly defeated.

Recognition of committee members who assisted in formulating this year's amendments is in order. They were: Nilo Azambuja - Latin America, Paul Britt - Gulf Coast, Paul English - Canada, Tom Ewing - Gulf Coast, Doug Patchen - Eastern and Mark Rainer - Southwest. ♦

Ad Hoc Committee on Advisory Council Representation

After months of gathering data, including sending a questionnaire to every Advisory Council (AC) member since 1999 (questionnaire results below), the Ad Hoc Committee on AC Representation convened in Dallas during the Annual AAPG meeting. The ensuing lengthy discussion/debate centered around the following questions: Are the Sections/Regions of the AAPG fairly and equitably represented by the current composition of the AC? Should distribution of Sectional/Regional representatives on the AC be more proportional to numbers of respective members (similarly to the *House*)?

The current Constitution and Bylaws states – a Section or Region shall be entitled to elect an additional Advisory Council member for each additional five thousand (5000) members, or any fraction thereof. In 2001 a resolution reflecting a more proportionally represented AC was brought to the *House* floor whereby the 5000 member level would drop to 1500, thus increasing the Gulf Coast membership on the AC by 3, Rocky Mountain by 2, and Southwest and Mid-Con membership by 1. Although this motion was defeated on the *House* floor in 2001 and again by our committee during our Dallas meeting, the salience of the subject precipitated an alternative in which the level for an additional AC member would drop from 5000 to 3000 – the net effect raising the Gulf Coast membership from 2 to 3, and all other Sections/Regions remaining the same. The spirited debate which pursued boiled down to a vote between this alternate proposal versus no change, with the final outcome being 4 to 2 (with one abstention) for no change to the current AC Section/Region membership composition.

This split vote is illustrative of the complexity of this issue. Part of our AAPG population remains steadfast that any deliberative group affecting the future of the AAPG should be proportionally represented - the argument being that this promotes fairness and equity, particularly in the long term when considering the evolving demographics of the organization.

On the other hand, the current makeup of the AC didn't happen overnight. In 1998, a distinguished 15-member committee came up with a final recommendation for the present reformulated AC. This new model, which was a compromise agreement and forwarded with 14 yeas and one abstention, was debated and successfully passed on the *House* floor in 1999. Therefore, there is also a large portion of the AAPG leadership who maintain that: 1) not enough time has elapsed for a qualified assessment, and 2) if it can't conclusively be proven that the current AC structure is broken - it doesn't need to be fixed.

In a very general sense, the latter argument led to the majority of our committee voting for no change.

The following items identify further arguments for no change as well as additional issues pertinent to our analysis:

1. Voting record for officer candidates and awardees. Although 2 to 3 more years of data would have been helpful, the last 4 years of AC voting information does not conclusively indicate that there is a trend of discrimination or bias against any Section or Region.

2. Size Matters. A resounding 81% of our questionnaire responders felt the AC would perform less efficiently if membership on the AC were increased.

3. The Equity Issue. When asked the question, How equitably do you think each member of AAPG is being represented by the Advisory Council?, a substantial 69% of our questionnaire responders picked 4 or better on a scale of 1 to 5. (5 being very equitably, 1 being not equitably).

4. The numbers game. One of the more legitimate concerns expressed by the Gulf Coast Section equates to a numbers issue. With a pool of 6000+ voting AAPG members, and only two Gulf Coast AC representatives, it has been a common occurrence that the 2 G.C. reps have neither met nor possess any personal knowledge of one or more of the Gulf Coast nominees. Since these awardee/officer candidate nominees are more likely to get through the first round of voting when someone on the AC has personal knowledge of them, the Gulf Coast Section is at a disadvantage when none of the Division Presidents or Past Presidents on the AC resides in the Gulf Coast. Our committee discussed Bylaw changes specifically addressing this situation, but failed to identify a procedurally practical plan, as permanent Bylaw changes to cyclical problems are difficult. On the plus side, there will also be times when the G.C. is more than adequately represented, as in this past year when 6 of the 17 voting members were from the G.C. Section. One could make the case that over time this averaging affect supersedes the need for a Bylaw change. The G.C. Section reps may need to realize that when their AC representation is low, additional pre-meeting work will be required.

5. Advisory versus Legislative. Recommended reading is an article by Lowell Lischer in the January 2002 *Delegates' Voice*. Lowell's emphasis is this – The AAPG Bylaws (Article V, Section 1) describe the AC as an advisory group that recommends awardee/officer candidates, performs strategic and long range planning, etc. As an advisory body, it is important that all the Sections, Regions, and Divisions have equal input and are heard. When the less populous Sections/Regions do not feel they are part of the process they can feel disenfranchised, which sadly, may precipitate a negative bias against a qualified individual from a populous Section. Under this scenario, proportional representation can ironically work against a larger Section.

That being said, it is also important to keep in mind that the Executive Committee (EC) now requires a super-majority to re-prioritize the nominee list sent from the AC. At a minimum, one can conclude the AC is legislatively influential in the nomination process. Very important nomination decisions born in the AC are very apt to become ratified in adulthood. It is these semi-legislative actions, which cause proportional representation to become more relevant.

A primary culprit for the present debate amongst some members is this fuzzy definition of the administrative role of the AC. Under these circumstances, the perspectives of individual members will probably always cover the spectrum.

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Conclusions

The current structure of the AC may not be perfect, but the majority of this committee has voted that the data at hand does not concretely prove that an alternate structure would be better. The AAPG membership is well served by this Advisory Council when said councilors exhibit the utmost professionalism and integrity. Anything less, and the proponents for proportional representation have a more valid argument.

Strong leadership and effective communication of AC voting procedures will always be essential to the process. Also, it needs to be stressed that all Sections and Regions should be very cognitive of the nominees selected for their respective AC seats since they share much responsibility in two very important functions of the AC: *Getting the best AAPG members into leadership positions, and ensuring that those AAPG members who are most deserving are properly recognized.*

The next step for this committee is to forward to the Chairman of the *House*, a culled down list of the answers to question #6 which pertained to miscellaneous suggestions/recommendations for improving the AC. Part of our original mandate was to consider every angle in which the AC could be improved and we appreciate the responders answers – they have greatly facilitated this effort.

Finally, I cannot express enough gratitude to my committee members for their hard work and perseverance through this complex ordeal. Many thanks go to Don Lewis (Vice-Chairman), Sandi Barber, Will Green, Paul Hoffman, Jean Lemmon, and Peter Lloyd. ♦

Point-Counterpoint

Clint Moore raised an issue in *The Delegates' Voice* Point-Counterpoint section last Fall concerning the Advisory Committee's use of Executive Session to consider certain matters in private. Robbie Gries responded with a counterpoint to that article for inclusion in the January DV. However, we were unable to publish it at that time because AAPG policy is that nothing can be published about a candidate who is currently running for an elected office. We are therefore publishing Robbie's response at this time.

Counterpoint Response to Clint Moore's Point:

Regarding the decision of the AC to continue the practice of going into Executive Session to deliberate on both candidates and honors and awards candidates...Mr. Moore implies this practice is used only because of a few past/present AC and EC leaders.

A vote to go into Executive Session is taken by the entire AC...all twenty members. During my time as chairman or subcommittee chairman (chairs do not vote unless there is a tie), the vote was either unanimous or near unanimous. This policy is not controlled by the chair but democratically by the governing body, all twenty members. Just as it was when Mr. Moore was on the Council. ♦
