
Reports of the Officers, Advisory Council, and House of Delegates

President

The 2018-2019 Executive Committee (EC) and AAPG's staff worked together to address the strategic geoscience and business aspects of AAPG as a professional society in a rapidly evolving global energy industry.

Sustainable Development


The 2018-2019 presidential theme of Sustainable Development embraced the fundamental values of AAPG. We continue to explore sedimentary basins, develop the energy resources they contain, and the technology to maximize extraction with minimal environmental footprint including carbon capture use and storage.



In this way we "meet the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs," the definition of sustainable development. Sustainable Development has become a unifying concept for the petroleum industry's role in providing "access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all."

Global Outreach – Membership Engagement

Sustainable Development is a concept that provides a forward-looking framework for AAPG to address the role of petroleum geoscience in the energy mix. It allows AAPG and the petroleum industry to communicate broadly the economic, environmental and societal benefits of the petroleum industry. These aspects of the petroleum industry are important



to our membership, especially young professionals and the next generation of students entering universities, and result in cause-driven membership for AAPG. The Sustainable Development Ad Hoc Committee is coordinating AAPG's technical content and outreach efforts.

The AAPG president's schedule to meet with companies and present talks to professional societies was coordinated with AAPG Foundation Visiting Geoscientist requests to speak at universities. The presentations and active engagement through panels and group discussions in 24 countries included 18 professional society conferences or meetings, 28 universities, and 5 Student and Young Professional (YP) leadership events reinforced AAPG's global presence and provided an opportunity to communicate our science and demonstrate our professionalism. I gratefully acknowledge the additional support of Storm Energy, Ltd. for AAPG geoscience outreach.

Highlights from the year's activities are recorded in the *EXPLORER* President's column and pubic posts on Facebook tagged with @AAPG and #SustainableDevelopment #AAPGSustainsMe.

Student/YP Global Leadership Summit (SC/YPLS) – Connecting AAPG Leaders

This year we coordinated the Advisory Council midyear meeting with an Executive Committee meeting and a Student and Young Professionals Leadership Summit. It brought together AAPG's experienced leaders with AAPG's future leadership and membership advocates. One of the value propositions of AAPG and a key to membership retention is to bridge the gap between members, young professionals, and students.

Sister Society Outreach

AAPG had a presence at the Geological Society of America with a technical session, "At the forefront of exploration and critical thinking" featuring AAPG's Distinguished Lecturers (DL). AAPG also organized technical oral and poster sessions on "The role of geoscience in sustainable energy solutions" for the American Geophysical Union's annual meeting. The sister society sessions and AAPG's presence in the exhibit halls were an opportunity for membership outreach with academia, government, and industry professionals interested in subsurface geoscience and energy.



Membership

AAPG president-elect Mike Party introduced the Membership Initiative Delivering AAPG Sustainability (MIDAS). It is a cooperative effort with the House of Delegates (HOD), the branch of AAPG governance charged with membership, to work with Corporate Advisory Board, Divisions, Sections and YP's to contact current and dropped members to renew their membership.

House of Delegates

Recognizing that one of the barriers to AAPG membership is the sponsorship requirement and acknowledging that the Division of Professional affairs provides an avenue to verify the ethical and professional character of members, the HOD passed an amendment to the bylaws to eliminate the requirement for sponsorship. The HOD also addressed a code of conduct issue that is of high importance to all professional societies and passed the Disciplinary Code amendment to AAPĠ's bylaws. Both amendments should have a positive effect on AAPG's membership.

Climate Change

The EC formed an Ad Hoc Committee of climate and paleo-climate scientists to address the topic of climate change. Although no official action was taken on a statement brought forth by the Ad Hoc Committee, it began a dialogue for AAPG to discuss an issue of importance to AAPG's membership, industry, and academia.

Science and Technology – Relevant Energy Content

When we meet at AAPG conferences, AAPG is fulfilling its mission and at its best: technical content with a business focus bringing together a diverse audience of attendees from academia, government and industry.

Geologic Events Oversite Committee

On the recommendation of the Geologic Events Oversight Committee, the EC approved the formation of a Global ACE Organizing Committee. This restructuring changes the ACE operating model from a location-based, affiliated society organizing committee to global committee independent of location. These changes are consistent with industry trends and recommendations from AAPG's Corporate Advisory Board to hold events in locations with large energy industry populations to maximize access to AAPG science and technology. ACE 2020 will be in Houston. Texas and in 2021 in Denver, Colorado.

The ACE restructuring also prompted a review and change in the ACE Surplus Sharing Policy. Beginning with ACE 2020, funds will be calculated based on net financial surplus and distributed proportional to geographic attendance to all AAPG sections and regions. The

section and region leadership will be responsible for further distribution of ACE funds to the AAPG affiliated societies. The new policy makes a stronger technical and financial connection between AAPG and all its sections and regions irrespective of event location.

ACE 2019

AAPG's Annual Convention and Exhibition was held in San Antonio and cohosted by the South Texas Geologic Society and the Austin Geological Society. Lorena Moscardelli, Equinor and Eddie Valek, EOG Resources, general cochairs, along with general vice cochairs Tom Ewing, Frontera Exploration and Dallas Dunlap, the Bureau of Economic Geology, and the entire Global Organizing Committee, delivered a dynamic and engaging conference and exhibition including 9 short courses, 11 fields trips, the International Pavilion, and U-Pitch.

New themes included Deep Integration of Data and Disciplines; Business, Finance, and the Regulatory Framework; and Energy Sustainability and the Environment. The blend of traditional and new themes brought an attendance and vitality to ACE that was enthusiastically noted by many. The Imperial Barrel Award competition, Student Career Seminar, and The Big Crew Change Session provided additional opportunities for mentoring, member engagement, and career networking.

ICE 2019

General chair Femi Esan assisted by general vice cochairs Sa'id Al Hajri, Saudi Aramco and Nosa Omorodiaon, Schlumberger, and Neil Hodgson, Spectrum organized an outstanding conference and exhibition for ICE





2019 in Cape Town, South Africa. Plenary sessions, panels, and special sessions on Global Energy Supply and Demand, Africa Successes, Next Age Technology, Business and the Regulatory Environment, and the Value of Diversity augmented the technical sessions for the five themes, three short courses, and two field trips. Student and Young Professional workshops and activities provided additional opportunities to network and meet AAPG leaders. ICE 2020 will be in Madrid, Spain.

International Pavilion

The International Pavilion is an integral part of AAPG's events and an important part of AAPG global presence. The IP, LLC was dissolved and now operates as a successful part of ACE, ICE, and other AAPG events.

U-Pitch

U-Pitch continues to grow as an entrepreneurial showcase for the innovated ideas and technology in the energy industry. U-Pitch, launched with ACE, now has a strong presence on the exhibits floor at ICE and URTeC and is expanding to section and region events.

New Events

AAPG launched two new events and participated in one new joint society event during the 2018-2019 year. The events addressed the technical and business aspects of the energy mix, the digital transformation, and will be offered again.

Energy Opportunities Conference, Cartagena, Colombia. The AAPG Latin America and Caribbean Region, led by Victor Vega, Shell organized a conference of quality technical, business, and innovation sessions with a high-level and diverse slate of speakers. The country snapshots – technical reviews highlighting investment options throughout the region – along with the facilitated Business-to-Business sessions truly allowed attendees to explore Energy Opportunities. Energy Opportunities will be run in Mexico City, 2020.

Energy Transitions Forum, Amsterdam, The Netherlands. The concept for the forum originated with the AAPG Europe Region leadership and was realized under the leadership of Max Brouwers, Shell. The forum covered four themes: the future of energy, sustainability, digitalization, and skills and new ways of working. Interactive panel-audience Q&A, in-depth exploration

of topics through café sessions, TED-style talks, and an IBM Design Thinking work session made for an engaging forum. The forum was successfully run again in Edinburgh, October 2019.

AAPG-SEG-SPE Energy in Data Conference, Austin, Texas, June 17-19, 2019. Managed by the Society of Exploration Geophysicists, the conference addressed the digital transformation in the petroleum industry, rethinking workflows, and how companies will conduct business from exploration to production to delivery. The conference will be offered again in 2021.

Outside Operated Events

AAPG continues to contribute to and benefit from established multi-partner events NAPE, OTC, and URTeC. AAPG and its partners launched regional events for both NAPE and URTeC to meet market demand and address the technical and business needs of our members.

Programs

The association greatly appreciates the dedication of our volunteers and the continued support of the AAPG Foundation for the education and outreach programs.

Programs face strategic decisions related to the in-person visits versus online distribution of content and engagement with AAPG's global membership. The Imperial Barrel Award program has evaluated section and region virtual competitions to manage costs and the Visiting Geoscientist Program has introduced online webinars to maximize its global reach.

Distinguished Lecturer. This year, the AAPG Foundation Distinguished Lecturer program recorded videos of the six lecturers and made them widely available through AAPG's media. Lecturers made in-person visits that focused on larger audiences and connections with AAPG's sections, regions, and sister societies. The strategic change in the DL program heightens the importance of local technical and non-technical visits by AAPG Visiting Geoscientists to maintain connections with students and universities.

Podcasts. Personal interviews with the Distinguished Lecturers captured as "Digging Deeper" video recordings helped test the market for AAPG podcasts. Podcasts are an avenue for AAPG to deliver content and engage with members, especially the younger demographic. They are also a potential source for fee-based revenue or advertising income.

Publications

One of AAPG's greatest assets is its technical content. The manner in which scientists are accessing content and how scientific organizations are rebundling content for publication is rapidly evolving. Content continues to move from hard copy into digital and print-on-demand space.

Bulletin and Special Publications. The EC approved incorporating AAPG memoir content into special issues of the *Bulletin*. The move provides a solution to hard copy publication costs and offers authors more timely exposure to the Bulletin and its high impact factor. Hard copy publications will continue to be considered based on topic and sponsorship. Two special publication books were released in FY2018-2019: Memoir 115 Rift-Related Coarse-Grained Submarine Fan Reservoirs and Memoir 117 Petroleum Basins and Hydrocarbon Potential of the Andes of Peru and Bolivia.

Datapages. The Datapages Board is keeping abreast of new technology to move AAPG's unstructured published content onto a platform that allows structuring and database aggregation that can be utilized in machine learning. Re-bundling of content opens new avenues for AAPG content to provide new revenue streams. The EC supported a proposal from the Datapages Board to evaluate technology platforms for improved delivery of the Bulletin and AAPG content.

Geoscience World. AAPG, through its seat on the GeoScienceWorld Board, is monitoring trends in open access publishing. GeoScience World is moving forward with an open access journal with a high impact factor as a place for papers with mandatory open access requirements. As a resource for earth science journals including the AAPG Bulletin, Geoscience World is an additional avenue to drive traffic back to AAPG for membership.

The Business of AAPG – Fiscal Stewardship

The 2018-2019 fiscal year ended with a stronger global presence, new ways to connect with multiple generations of geoscientists, and a balanced budget. It is imperative the association continue to



evaluate operations and partnerships to remain responsive to geoscientists and the rapidly evolving energy industry.

Budget and Investment portfolio

The Association had positive financial results this year due to favorable variances from the membership dues increase, Datapages revenue, and better than anticipated income from outside multipartner events. AAPG continues to operate prioritized programs within the constraints of the budget with a lean, dedicated staff responsive to the membership. The investment portfolio performed well and ended the year with better than budgeted results. The investment portfolio is now ably managed by Vanguard with oversight by AAPG's Investment Committee.

Defined Benefits Program

The termination of the Defined Benefit Plan, recommended by the Pension Committee and approved by the 2017-2018 EC, removed a long-standing liability for AAPG. The program termination was completed in 2018 in accordance with IRS regulations with funds set aside in the investment portfolio below projected cost.

Respect the Past, Live in the Present, Plan for the Future

On behalf of the 2018-2019 Executive Committee, we recognize with respect all the past AAPG members, volunteers, and leaders whose wisdom and tenacity have shepherded AAPG to this point.

It has been a privilege to serve the AAPG with the 2018-2019 Executive

Committee: president-elect Mike Party, vice president regions Dave Cook, vice president sections Jeff Aldrich, secretary Laura Johnson, treasurer Richard Ball, editor Barry Katz, and HoD chair Bill Houston – their insights, dedication and good humor made the year productive and rewarding.

A sincere note of gratitude to AAPG's executive director David Curtiss and deputy executive director David Lange along with the entire AAPG staff for their support – they are the continuity that sustains the Association.

Finally, I am thankful for all the AAPG members – you are the heart and soul of AAPG.

Treasurer

Despite the continuing challenges as a result of the downturn of the energy industry from 2015, fiscal year 2019 reflected the first financial relief for the organization since 2014. The new economic environment continues to impact meeting attendance, sponsorship and exhibitors which support the geosciences resulting in a lower. Despite these trends, AAPG's programs and events performed fairly well during the year. Our continued focus to optimize our operations allowed for AAPG to finish favorable to budget for the year. This was the first time in a number of years that we were able to end the year with an overall surplus.

Revenues from dues were a refreshing relief as the rate of recent decline in our

membership slowed. Interest and dividends were also a very nice result as our portfolio, managed by the AAPG Investment Committee, performed well in the stock market. Subscriptions to the *Bulletin*, revenue from educational activities and sales of publications have declined. The publications and subscriptions look to face increased pressure as the tastes and preferences of consumers change and mergers and acquisitions concentrate the available customers.

AAPG continues to benefit from our cooperative partner events, including the NAPE Expo and our interests in the Offshore Technology Conference (OTC). The NAPE event was up slightly as was the OTC in fiscal year 2019. AAPG's presence and participation in these partner events remains an important aspect of our activities and sources of revenue.

We continue to challenge ourselves and headquarters staff to be good stewards of our members' resources while delivering a high level of member benefits. Despite cost saving and expense reduction efforts, overall expenses for the year were higher from the prior year but were lower than budget.

The AAPG Budget Review Committee and Executive Committee are continuing to evaluate AAPG's programs and activities to determine which activities should continue to be supported in these challenging economic times. The business uncertainties facing the oil and gas industry will continue to put pressure on our pool of available resources. We will continue to not only focus on cost savings, but also invest in programs that provide value to our members and promote our profession. Our Tulsa headquarters staff continues to review ways to reduce costs and improve efficiencies in operations as doing more with less remains a byproduct of the continued industry downturn.

The Investment Committee is working to ensure that AAPG's investment portfolio is properly positioned to help the Association deal with future economic uncertainties. The growth in the Association's investment portfolio during the year provided a larger financial reserve.

Looking forward to FY 2020, your Executive Committee expects a favorable financial year. We will continue to be prudent with our members assets while AAPG continues to serve its members and the geoscience community.

Editor




Figure 1. *The disposition of 2018 initial submissions.*

The AAPG Bulletin remains strong with 283 new submittals in 2018 along with 428 revised submissions. The disposition of these initial submissions is summarized in Figure 1. Approximately half of the submissions were rejected in present form, indicating that the science is of interest but there are significant flaws with the manuscript that can be corrected. Slightly more than 25% of the submissions were accepted pending revision, suggesting only relatively minor revisions are required prior to final acceptance and publication. Just under a quarter of the manuscripts were rejected. Rejections fall into multiple categories: the science was

deemed poor, the writing quality was such that a review could not be completed, the manuscript is nonunique or may be plagiarized (this could include self-plagiarism), or the manuscript was submitted from a sanctioned country.

These manuscripts were received from 38 countries. The United States accounted for approximately 25% of the submissions. China accounted for 43% of the submissions. The remaining 36 countries account for about one-third of the submissions. A further review indicates that slightly more than 70% of the submissions are submitted by authors with English as a second-language, which places stress

on the publication processes at multiple levels. One manuscript required seven revisions prior to its final acceptance.

The total number of submissions required the editorial team to contact 1590 potential reviewers. Of these 643 individual reviewers were engaged and 176 of these reviewers provided multiple reviews. The top reviewers, with more than five reviews, are presented in Table 1. The countries contributing to the greatest number of completed reviews were the United States (254), China (222), and the United Kingdom (39). The remaining reviews were from 33 other countries.

The *Bulletin* included one special issue documenting some of the contributions to the AAPG Hedberg Research Conference on "The Future of Basin and Petroleum System Modeling" (BPSM), held in Santa Barbara, California, April 3–8, 2016.

In 2018 the *Bulletin* added pages and ended its practice of publishing the organization's honorees and annual report to make more space for technical contributions.

The Wallace E. Pratt Memorial Award for the best AAPG Bulletin article was awarded to Kurt William Rudolph and Franklin James Goulding for "Benchmarking exploration predictions and performance using 20+ yr of drilling results: One company's experience ." The J. C. "Cam" Sproule Memorial Award for best paper to a younger author was awarded to Yuanjia Han, Brian Horsfield, Richard Wirth, Nicolai Mahlstedt, and Sylain Bernard for "Oil retention and porosity evolution in organic-rich shales." The Robert H. Dott, Sr. Memorial Award was not awarded.

In 2018 we published two memoirs: *Rift-related coarse-grained submarine*

Advisory Council

Thanks to Honors and Awards chair Joe Davis and vice-chair Ryan Lemiski and to Officer Nomination chair Craig Eckert and vice-chair John Hogg. These committees worked proactively, respectfully, and collaboratively to recruit and recognize an outstanding slate of globally diverse officer candidates and awardees.

Thanks to President Denise Cox for hosting a concurrent Young Professionals (YP) Summit on October 19-20, 2018. By careful planning, the Advisory Council and YP summit coordinated to bring current and future leaders together. In addition, YP attendees received a copy of the DPA/AAPG publication *Heritage of Petroleum Geologists*. This book

features inspirational stories from 101 amazing men and women in the energy profession.

As part of the Advisory Council efforts this year, I include this report by Strategy and Long-Term Planning committee chair Nick Lagrilliere and the following committee members: Joel Alberts, Paul Britt, Joe Davis, Anne Draucker, Craig Eckert, John Hogg, Ryan Lemiski, and Natasha Rigg

Following the Advisory Council meeting in October, the revitalized committee set out to define its vision, mission, and goals. The committee held a grounding session in which external (Shell scenarios, BP Energy Outlook, EIA Annual Energy Outlook, etc.) and internal (AAPG Strategic Plan 2012, AAPG Ad Hoc Committee on Governance 2015, AAPG Strategic assessment 2017) perspectives were used to define its vision as "Providing the foundation for long-range planning and strategy in AAPG." The committee set out on its mission to

- identify opportunities for business growth, investigate new business areas (geothermal, environmental, energy minerals, etc.);
- investigate technological developments (artificial intelligence, machine learning, etc.):
- evaluate whether there are high-impact low-cost programs to be developed and low-impact high-cost programs to be retired;
- ensure that AAPG deploys lean and cost-effective processes; and
- work towards longer term goals of reflecting on changes to AAPG governance, define the Association's

future by reviewing review, and updating the AAPG strategic plan.

The committee identified a number of near-term goals, which were mostly delivered by the 2019 annual convention in San Antonio. An analysis was conducted and a number of recommendations developed to ensure that the honors and awards nominations reflect the current diversity and the Association. Progress was made towards defining actions required to develop a leadership pipeline and succession planning. An initial analysis of programs found that past efforts to retire low-impact high-cost programs has been successful. A proposal to eliminate the sponsorship requirement for qualified members was carried by the Advisory Council and subsequently proposed by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee to the House of Delegates which then voted in favor. In collaboration with the International Regions Committee, the competitive environment in the Regions was analyzed.

The focus is now shifting to the midterm goal of reviewing and updating the AAPG strategic plan for which a new committee working group will be formed, which will aim to collaborate broadly with the Divisions, Sections, Regions, Corporate Advisory Board, etc. We will strive to further develop Region specific business plans framed in the local competitive landscape. The aim is to also provide the strategic framework for future proofed programs and activities that are underpinned by sound financial performance. Current efforts regarding honors and awards, nominations, leadership pipeline and succession planning will be also be continued. In the long term, the committee envisages



its focus shifting towards the intense competition from other societies that consistently outperform AAPG and looking at potential structural solutions to address the situation.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the committee members for delivering quality analyses and reports, maturing concrete proposals and engaging discussions...with room for plenty of laughter along the way. Special thanks to Vicki Beighle, Vern Stefanic, and the staff in Tulsa for their continued dedicated support. Finally, my appreciation to the other members of the Advisory Council and in particular chair Charles Sternbach for taking a keen interest and being actively involved in the key discussions.

House of Delegates

Although the House of Delegates (HOD) chair-elect has one year to get up to speed, the one year spent as chair of the House goes by extraordinarily quickly! In addition to steering the activities of the House, the chair is a voting member of the Executive Committee and serves as an observer on the Advisory Council (and a voting member of the AC as past-chair of the House).

The biggest challenge for the chair is to pursue a manageable agenda over the course of the year. This is especially true for any proposals involving rules and procedures or the constitution and bylaws. Oftentimes proposals involve simple housekeeping, while others require extended debate to evaluate significant change. Every effort is also made to craft an annual meeting agenda that is manageable. At +/-4 hours in San Antonio, this is within but at the fringe of productive limits.

In San Antonio significant proposals were passed by super majority (>2/3 of voting members voting for):

- Amendment to the bylaws passed clarifying our elected delegate terms of office (see updated Constitution and Bylaws (C&BL), Article VI; 1.C.5)
- Amendment to the bylaws passed removing the requirement for endorsement by a sponsor for membership (see updated C&BL, Article III; 1.A.2.a)
- Amendment to the bylaws passed strengthening our professional conduct and discipline policy (see updated C&BL, Appendix B; section 1)
- Amendment to the HOD Rules and Procedures passed by inserting a new section IV on Professional Conduct and Discipline defining (A) professional conduct and (B) violations of professional conduct. In addition, (C), (D), and (E) stipulated procedures to follow should complaints/accusations of violations against a Member be lodged (see updated Rules and Procedures Section IV).

Report of the Foundation

The AAPG Foundation was established to support programs that benefit the geologic profession and the general public. Our purpose is to encourage a better understanding and advancement of the geosciences and to establish programs and fund projects that support the education, training and career enhancement for earth scientists.

My report will provide an update on the Foundation's activities and preliminary financial results for the past fiscal year which ended on June 30, 2019. Please be aware the Foundation is currently in the midst of its annual financial audit, and the financial information presented here is unaudited and is subject to change.

Contributions and Program Support

Contributions to the Foundation this past fiscal year (July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019) were \$551K, and awards and grants amounted to \$1.17M. Contributions to the Foundation for FY 2018 were significantly higher, predominately due to a bequest from the estate of Frank Adler in the amount of \$530,639.

As is typical, 80% of total contributions are from AAPG members. Eighty-five percent of the contributions were from individuals with 15% coming from corporations.

The Trustee Associates support has been and continues to be a critical and important factor in the growth and development of the Foundation.

AAPG Foundation Investment Portfolio

The investment portfolio is conservatively invested and well diversified. The portfolio includes public and private equity investments, fixed income mutual funds, international investments and real estate. Last fiscal year, the Foundation's investment portfolio showed a modest decrease net of withdrawals with an ending balance of \$48.4M as of June 30, 2019. This

compares to \$48.5M as of June 30, 2018, \$47.9M as of June 30, 2017, \$45.0M on June 30, 2016, and \$46.5M on June 30, 2015. The Foundation continued to utilize a 4% spending rate on endowed funds in support of programs.

Reports of the Divisions

Energy Minerals Division

The primary mission of Energy Minerals Division (EMD) is to serve AAPG members by promoting the geological sciences related to any geological energy resources other than conventional oil and gas. Membership is free to all AAPG members. The EMD currently has 10 active commodity committees, listed alphabetically: bitumen/ heavy oil, coal, coalbed methane, critical minerals, gas hydrates, geothermal, oil shale, shale gas & liquids, tight gas sands, and uranium. Each commodity committee is chaired by representatives from industry, government, and academia, serving twoyear terms. The president's goals for fiscal 2018-2019 were (1) member engagement, (2) servant leadership, and (3) intersociety cooperation.

- Organized Mudstone Diagenesis workshop for SEPM International Sedimentary Geosciences Congress April 2020 meeting (Flagstaff)
- Filled vacancies for four section councilors and two region councilors (one vacancy remains)
- Added new Publications Committee chairs, a new Critical Minerals technical committee, and a Young Professional liaison position

Division of Environmental Geosciences

In 1992 the HoD approved the creation of the Division of Environmental Geosciences (DEG) under the leadership of Bruno Hanson. Hanson's vision was that the petroleum industry would continually demonstrate both environmental stewardship and leadership. Our goals and objectives are as follows.

 Educate the membership of AAPG and the general public about important issues that affect petroleum energy minerals exploration and production.

- Communicate to the general public and government agencies the Association's commitment to protect the environment while developing the world's natural resources in a responsible manner.
- Support and encourage research into the effects of petroleum/energy minerals exploration and production on the environment, and make available to concerned agencies, companies, and individuals the results of these studies and recommendations.
- Apply the expertise developed in the petroleum/energy minerals industries and hydrogeology to resolve environmental problems.
- Promote environmental stewardship within the petroleum/energy minerals industries.
- Establish a liaison between and among AAPG and other professional societies for the purposes of constructive dialogue and defining mutually obtainable goals.
- Provide relevant educational opportunities and services for professional development of the AAPG membership through seminars and conferences in environmental geosciences, hydrogeology, and related fields.

Membership Trends

The DEG membership dues are \$25/ year. Similar to AAPG, DEG has lost members over the years, but division membership grew in 2018 and 2019. In May of 2018, the total DEG membership was 865. As of April 1, 2019, our membership stood at 949.

Publications

The DEG's Editor is Olga Popova. She oversees the division's *Environmental Geosciences* journal (a quarterly publication) and the *Spheres of Influence* newsletter (December 2018 issue). The *EG* journal published two peer-reviewed articles each quarter (June, September,

December and March). This year, Autumn Haagsma (chair, CCUS ad hoc committee) and Olga Popova coordinated efforts to publish an *EG* special edition on carbon capture, underground storage and re-use based on the related sessions at ACE 2019.

Events

The largest planning and execution for AAPG events by DEG are the ACE meetings. For both the ACE 2018 and ACE 2019 meetings, the DEG president was on the ACE organizing committee to assist the environment-related themes. Environmental presentations included oral and poster sessions on carbon capture, storage and re-use, induced seismicity, sustainability, water and other environmental topics. The DEG organized a special session on environmental impact and sustainability, and its keynote speaker was Iain Stewart who discussed "Communicating Contested Geoscience to the Public: 'Matters of Fact' vs. 'Matters of Concern.'" The DEG organized the joint DEG-EMD luncheon this year (every other year responsibility). Our speaker was Eirik Waerness, chief economist of Equinor, who spoke on "Global Energy Transition—An Uncertain Outcome Driven by Developments in Policy, Technology and Behavior." The DEG helped sponsor the PROWESS event held on Saturday evening.

Almost all AAPG 2018-2019 sectional meetings in the United States had at least one session that involved environmental topics. It reflects the local leaderships' desire to promote environmental stewardship. This was also true for the ICE 2018 meeting and in ICE 2019 planning. The DEG helped by promoting these events' activities and abstract submission mainly, although we assisted in ICE 2019 planning at the invitation of its organizing committee. As a DEG officer, Mary Barrett attended the 2017 Mid-Continent meeting, the 2017 and 2018 GCAGS meetings, the 2018 Eastern Section meeting, and the ACE 2018 and 2019 meetings. I additionally attended the 2018 UrTec meeting, the 2018 SPE national meeting, and the 2018 GSA national meeting.

Division of Professional Affairs

The Division of Professional Affairs' (DPA) charge is to strengthen the professional status of geoscientists and to require high standards of competence among practicing geoscientists while communicating the affairs of the Division and the profession to geoscientists. We also communicate to the general public and to government agencies. The Association's constant concern is to protect the public by restricting the practice of petroleum geology to those known to be qualified and believed to be competent and reliable. The DPA communicates to the general public and to governmental agencies pertinent information on legislative and administrative decisions affecting the regulation of petroleum resource exploration and development. In addition, the DPA maintains and administers certification requirements through a Board of Certification. We also encourage high professional standards in the training of geoscience majors in university departments.

Membership

The DPA membership is declining like the other divisions and active membership in AAPG as a result of demographic changes in the oil and gas industry. Our older members, the ones most likely to be DPA members, are retiring and do not see a need to maintain their AAPG membership and therefore their DPA membership. There is also a decreased need for the number of geoscientists than in the past because of the move to unconventional resource plays and the continued workflow efficiencies within the business cycle. Our ranks have decreased at an average annual rate of 5.75% resulting in a loss of more than one-fifth of the DPA membership over the last 4 years. This has gotten the attention of the AAPG executive board and the DPA executive

board and has become the primary challenge of the AAPG and the DPA.

Activities

The DPA has been busy in the first half of 2019. This month marks the beginning of the 2019-2020 fiscal year of the Division of Professional Affairs and my term as president of the DPA. I would like to acknowledge the accomplishments of Mark Gallagher's presidency and the people that made it happen. The DPA's charge is deepening and expanding geoscience professionalism. We achieve this directive in many ways; one being the strengthening of our business acumen. This was the object of Mark's focus as president of the DPA. It started with the "Money Makers Business Forum" in Oklahoma City last April and followed up with the four DPA sponsored sessions at this year's Annual Convention and Exhibition in San Antonio. They were the Discovery Thinking Forum, Opportunity Valuation, and Deals and Investment Decisions and Financing. Although some of these topics are often disassociated from geology, they are what allows us to pursue our geologic passion. If you desire to be an oil and gas entrepreneur (or it has been thrust upon you) these sessions offered important information and personal perspectives about how to be successful, aka make money, in that business. Afterall, most of the wells drilled are by these entrepreneurs. Finally, a big thank you to Deb Sacrey who was speaker at the well-attended DPA luncheon. Despite being served turkey meatloaf from a tube, she gave an exceptional presentation about her varied career highlighting the of the ups and downs of her life in the oil patch—reinvention.

I would like to say thank you to the outgoing executive board members: Mark Gallagher (president), Meredith Faber (vice president) and Peggy Williams (secretary). The new incoming DPA Board consists of Steve Goolsby (vice president), Margo Liss (secretary) and Meredith Faber (president-elect). Mike Rains will be continuing as the editor of the DPA quarterly publication The Correlator. We continue to appreciate Diane Keim, our AAPG Staff liaison. I look forward to working with the incoming board and Diane on another exciting year

Reports of the Regions and Sections

Africa Region

2018-2019 Activities

Events

The 2018-2018 year for the Africa Region (AR) was rich and packed with several activities catering to the needs of geoscientists in various spheres—from the student community to young professionals, academicians, and upstream industry professionals. The highlight for the year was the return of AAPG ICE to Cape Town, South Africa. The event held beginning November 4, 2018, at the Cape Town International Convention Centre had 1.000 professionals in attendance and boasted 44 technical sessions, 5 panel sessions, a keynote luncheon, several short courses, and a YP Program.

Immediately following this was AAPG's participation in Nigerian sister society, NAPE annual conference in November 2019. AAPG was ably represented by AAPG president Denise Cox and Africa Region president Femi Esan. The conference highlights were

- NAPE/AAPG/EAGE joint panel session themed "Enhancing exploration activities in the current global outlook: New Plays and New Approaches"
- Joint NAPE/AAPG YP Leadership forum—Denise Cox, key speaker
- NAPE/AAPG student sessions led by the YP: Basin evaluation competition, CV writing and career mentoring and poolside student networking session with upstream industry practitioners
- Women in Geosciences session—Denise Cox, key speaker
- AAPG exhibition booth—manned by AR programs manager and leadership team present.

Students

The Africa Region student programs and the IBA have increasing renown, with the 2019 AAPG IBA having 23 student teams register for the competition. The competition hosted in Lagos in March 2019, saw the student team of Ain Shams University emerge in first position. This team went on to receive an award for innovation at the 2019 ACE in San Antonio.

Africa Region continues to grow its VGP Program, covering most chapters in Nigeria, South Africa, and Egypt. With the Region harnessing the zeal of upstream professionals to participate in the program,

2018 had 1,556 students benefit from the program.

The Africa Region rolled out a pilot student initiative tagged the African Undergraduate Geoscience Student competition, AUGSC. It was held to foster the collaboration and synergy between the academia and industry and promote student membership drive and student chapters growth besides developing and improving technical excellence and skills amongst geoscience students. The pioneer program held in Lagos in May 2019 and involved 25 AAPG student chapters.

Young Professionals

The YP mentoring initiative was set-up between AAPG AR and EAGE Nigeria to foster interaction and mentoring between young professionals and upstream industry professionals. It is an ongoing annual initiative that has seen 11 mentors sign up for participation. The mentoring activities are being refined to encourage virtual communication so as not to be limited by distance.

Five YP online monthly seminars have been held in partnership between AAPG and NAPE since October 2018. The program is ongoing and features accomplished industry professionals. The platform allows for physical and virtual participation of YP.

National visits

Following the 2018 ICE in Cape Town, AAPG president Denise Cox was involved in a brief tour to selected countries in southern Africa. She visited the National Enterprise of Hydrocarbon, ENH, Mozambique, the National Petroleum Corporation of Namibia, and NAMCOR on behalf of AAPG in November 2018, with proposals for partnership.

Awards

A distinguished service award was received by K. B Trivedi – Africa Region Delegate. Tunbosun Afolayan received the Young Professionals Exemplary Service Award at the 2019 ACE in San Antonio.

2019 Proposals

Delegate Elections

Proposed for 2019-2020 is the AAPG Africa Region delegate election, which was due by October 2019. There are six elective positions available for the delegates and one position for Advisory Council member.

Events

The Region is preparing to hold two GTW workshops in 2019 and 2020. The Eastern Mediterranean Mega-Basins GTW was to be held September 6-7 in Alexandria, Egypt. Work is in progress on a GTW in Mozambique in 2020.

Canada Region Events

The Canadian Society of Petroleum Geologists (CSPG, International Division) and the AAPG Canada Region cohosted a series of 10 talks over the winter and spring months including topics such as induced seismicity, deep-water frontier basins, and geology of the Scottish Highlands, to name just a few.

AAPG President Visit

AAPG president Denise Cox visited the Canada Region in January 2019. Aspects of her visit included a joint networking social held with CSPG and a luncheon talk delivered to members of the AAPG/CSPG. Denise also spent time with the University of Calgary and Mount Royal University student chapters. There are approximately eight active student chapters in Canada. Unfortunately, reports were not received from all chapters this year. However, the University of Ottawa/Carleton University held several events including two technical talks, a geological field trip to the Niagara region of Ontario coorganized with McMaster University's AAPG student chapter. The University of Calgary participated in the Distinguished Lecturer Program as well as hosted a visit from AAPG president Denise Cox.

Young Professionals

Due to budgeting constraints the Young Professionals had a limited program this year—participating jointly in an intersociety networking social event with such organizations as SPE, YPE, YPCA, YPC, CSPG, and CSEG during the holiday season. Reports of the Committees and Special Interest Groups

Astrogeology Committee

Primary Objective

The primary objective of the AAPG Astrogeology Committee is to present potential benefits and issues in space exploration for the AAPG membership and to look at the evolving role of energy professionals as we expand our activities beyond Earth's surface. Other objectives include organizing symposia at AAPG and professional meetings, recommending speakers for distinguished lectures, generating publications, organizing technical sessions and field trips, and acting as liaison with groups having similar interests such as NASA. All who are interested in astrogeology, planetary science, and their applications to energy and resource issues are invited to join the Astrogeology Committee.

Relevance

The Astrogeology Committee supports the development of space resources. The composition of comets and meteorites provide a starting point for understanding the origin and evolution of the solar system. Recent interest in mining rare earth elements and platinum group metals from asteroids and helium-3 on the Moon is facilitated by our understanding of the origin and economics of terrestrial ore deposits. In situ resource utilization, coupled with advanced spacetransportation and energy systems, is a critical component in successful human exploration and occupation habitation of the Moon, beginning in the 2020s, and Mars, beginning in the 2030s.

Major Goal in 2019-2020

This goal is to establish partnerships with the private space industry to promote exploration and development of space energy resources. Institutional and private space-related products and services are estimated to include 120,000 full-time-equivalent positions, generating \$150 billion annually. Private space companies comprise a \$10 to \$17B industry per year with 8-15% annual growth rates. SpaceX has been developing the Falcon 9, Dragon cargo and crew capsules, and Falcon Heavy launch systems. Other prominent firms involved in resource development, human-habitation facilities and

transportation systems include Boeing, Lockheed Martin and Bigelow Aerospace, Deep Space Industries, and Planetary Resources. There are now 13 countries that have successfully launched probes into Earth orbit and beyond. Human expansion into space is an international focus of both public and private interests and the AAPG Astrogeology Committee seeks to establish a presence with these endeavors and demonstrate the benefits to our members.

Other Activities

- The Astrogeology Committee sponsored the technical session "New Discoveries in the Solar System: Implications for Energy and Mineral Resources" at the 2019 ACE in San Antonio, Texas. Diverse topics included proposed missions to the Moon as a stepping-stone to Mars, in situ resources and utilization for human settlement on Mars, the space economy and strategic minerals on Earth and the inner Solar System, new technological developments in planetary geophysical characterization, and seismic characterization of the Chicxulub impact. Attendance for these presentations exceeded 150 persons.
- A proposed technical session at ACE 2020 in Houston is in under the theme "Expanding Energy Frontiers on Earth, Moon and Mars." We appreciate the support of EMD president-elect Edith Wilson in arranging this session.
- Preparation for the 2020 ACE meeting in Houston for an all-day field trip to Houston Space Center on Saturday, June 6. The event is scheduled to be cohosted by VIP Astrogeology Committee liaisons Harrison H. Schmitt (Apollo 17 astronaut) and James F. Reilly (director, USGS and Space Shuttle astronaut).
- Establishing a series of AAPG
 Astrogeology student chapters in conjunction with the AAPG student chapter. Their goal is to link interested students with professionals in the aerospace and planetary science community. Activities include technical meetings with guest speakers and astrogeology projects.

Astrogeology Committee Membership and Leadership

Douglas Cook and William Ambrose served as chair and vice chair, respectively, in the 2018-2019 year. Harrison Schmitt and James Reilly served as astronaut/geologist (ret.) liaisons. New officers in the 2019-2020 year are William Ambrose and Bruce Cutright (co-chairs), Douglas Cook and Matthew Brzostowski (co-vice chairs), and Stephanie Nwoko (EC Liaison). Harrison Schmitt and James Reilly continue to serve as astronaut/geologist (ret.) liaisons.

Climate Change Ad Hoc

In the fall of 2018, and at the request of several AAPG members, the Executive Committee of the AAPG approved the formation of an ad hoc committee to address the issue of climate change and serve at the pleasure of the president, Denise Cox. The group took shape under the direction of the chair, Edith Wilson, and was populated with members representing the geographic, demographic, and career diversity of the Association. The committee included those recommended by members of the Advisory Council and the Sustainable Development Ad Hoc Committee. Committee members focused on creating a foundation for the AAPG to develop a policy and strategy on climate by first crafting a simple, scientifically focused and forward-looking statement on climate change. After multiple teleconferences and drafting sessions, the committee proposed a new climate change statement to the Executive Committee at their February 15, 2019, meeting in Houston as follows.

 recognizes the abundant and compelling evidence that human activities are a key factor in current climate change, as referenced in the collective authoritative statements of the global National Academies of Science and the comprehensive analyses on climate science as presented by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change.

- accepts that these scientific observations require concerted worldwide action to avoid the worst impacts of future climate change.
- supports national and international climate frameworks as important roadmaps towards meeting climate change commitments and accelerating the market-led and policy-driven transition to lower-carbon forms of energy.
- offers to empower the future by employing the surface and subsurface geological skills and talents of our members in areas such as carbon capture and storage, geothermal energy development, and critical minerals extraction, and to use creativity and innovation in the responsible and sustainable development of hydrocarbons, with the goal of reducing humanity's carbon footprint.
- accepts the immense challenges of the energy transition and welcomes the important role that AAPG scientists will play in delivering sustainable energy to the world.

The statement as proposed is currently being considered and revised by Executive Committee members. The 2018-2019 Climate Change Committee will sunset at the end of the AAPG fiscal year on June 30, 2019, but its members remain available as a resource on this issue to future AAPG members and leaders.

Field Safety

In the past year, the AAPG Field Safety Committee has accomplished the following.

- We have reached the point where field trip participants are proactively asking about the safety aspects of trips, indicating that our ongoing efforts in field safety education are improving awareness and generating a "pull" for the field safety process. Indeed, NOLS and REI are now offering a wilderness safety training course that covers almost exactly the curriculum of our field safety leadership course.
- 2. The peer-review process for field activity preparation is working well. Alicia Collins has been instrumental in making the system work. The peer review is intended to assist the trip leader in ensuring that significant risks have been considered and reasonable preparations have been made. The peer reviews are volunteers who have been trained in the AAPG field safety course. The review concentrates on key aspects of technical, logistical, and safety preparations.
- A continuing challenge is communicating expectations for fieldtrip safety preparation to the field trip committee chairs for ACE meetings, because of the ever-changing roster of those serving in those positions. Continuing to work with AAPG HQ support staff to clarify and communicate expectations to local ACE

- committees. At GSA, the field trip chair for their 2018 meeting took our field safety leadership course specifically to prepare for his duties.
- 4. Trained 10 people in one session of field safety leadership course offered as AAPG short course (on quite short notice, in March 2019). Trained eight people in one session of field safety leadership course in conjunction with GSA (November 2018). Attendees came from a variety of organizations: international, domestic, and national energy companies, consultants, academia (secondary, university), and a state geological survey. Completing preparations for a session at GSA in Phoenix, Arizona, in September 2019; this session will include a co-instructor from NAGT/GSA.
- 5. Bid farewell to Alice Stagner, welcomed back Steve Oliveri and Keith Shanley to the Field Safety Committee. Added two members as liaison to GSA and NAGT: Emily Finzel (University of Iowa) and Kurt Burmeister (University of Pacific). Working on recruiting more diverse representation on the committee.
- Completed two new chapters on how people get hurt in the field and why people get hurt in the field along with revisions on three other chapters for the second edition of the popular book, Field Safety in Uncontrolled Environments.
- Expanded collaboration with Geological Society of America on establishing a field safety interest group to share common approach and lessons among programs.
 - a. Held a town hall session at GSA national meeting in November 2018 (attended by approximately 35 people) on emergency response plans and establishing an ongoing method for sharing safety lessons.
 - Participated (by invitation) in AGU/ AGI heads and chairs webinar on implementing effective field safety policies (recording available at https://youtu.be/fJdYrytop8c).
 - c. Designed a system for collecting incident (illness, injury) data from field camps, in collaboration with the executive secretary of the National Association of Geoscience Teachers (NAGT)-USGS Cooperative Field Training Program; the system is being tested this summer by a handful of camps.
 - d. Working with GSA, NAGT, and USGS to convene a field education forum at GSA national meeting in September 2019 to share safety lessons.
 - e. Working with GSA and NAGT to set up a field safety workshop for field-

camp directors to be held in November 2019 at University of Iowa.

Geophysical Integration

The function of the Committee on Geophysical Integration (GIC) is to promote and support the integration of geophysical data with geological and reservoir data by working with the Research Committee, Education Committee, Publications Committee, and with other professional societies in proposing, designing and conducting technical sessions, workshops and short courses at meetings and conferences, in preparing proposals for Hedberg Conferences and special publications, and seeking authors for technical papers for the AAPG Bulletin demonstrating the importance of geophysical integration. Geophysical Integration Committee also recommends candidates for editor for the Geophysical Corner published in the AAPG EXPLORER, works with the Geoscience Data Preservation Committee and Education Committee in preparing a listing of public domain geophysical data to promote the preservation of geophysical data; and facilitates intersociety cooperation with other affiliated societies, such as SEG, SPE, EAGE, and AGU. To accomplish these goals, the GIC is organized into three subcommittees: (1) AAPG/SEG Joint Sessions, (2) Publications, and (3) Symposia and Workshops.

Currently, GIC has 11 key members listed officially on the AAPG website. In addition to that, it has many other extended members, who always have innovative ideas and make great contributions for GIC successes.

During the fiscal year of 2018-2019, GIC has done tremendous works mainly focusing on some activities as below.

- 1. Publications: As mentioned above, the GIC members play key roles in AAPG/SEG and Joint Journal Interpretation editorial board. We are involved in organizing at least four or five special sections to be published in the journal in and act as assistance editors, associate editors. or reviewers. https://library.seg.org/page/inteio/interpretation-special-sections. The GIC's members also help to review manuscripts for AAPG Bulletin.
- OTC 2019 and upcoming OTC 2020: While organizing AAPG panel and technical sessions and reviewing the OTC abstracts, GIC members have

- collaborated with the other societies such as SPE and SSEG to organize joint panel, invited and technical sessions for OTC that have been very well attended.
- Collaboration with other sister professional societies. The GIC Committee members play key roles in AAPG/SEG/OTC and SPE.
 - Robert Wiener is the cochairman of the HGS's North America group (2014-2017), HGS vice president (2017-2018), and organized two talks from prominent SEG members.
 - Joe Davis is the AAPG Southwest advisory counselor
 - Hongliu Zeng is the Deputy EIC for Interpretation journal.
 - Hongliu Zeng, David Johnston, Donald Herron and Huyen Bui are on the editorial board of *Interpretation* iournal.
 - Huyen Bui is a member of the SEG Earth Model Committee and vice chair of the AAPG subcommittee of the OTC Technical Program Committee.
 - Conor Ryan is the SPE Ireland chairman and SPE International EPC.

In order to shape the form of GIC's activities in the near future, GIC will continuously to focus on three main areas of publication, OTC and strengthen the collaboration with other sister societies through joint workshops and sessions. On the other hand, we will need to reach out to the universities and young professionals to recruit some new members and train them to be the next generation to keep GIC strongly moving forward in the next decades.

On behalf of the committee, I would like to express special thanks to AAPG for great support in the past year. I would like to thank all of the GIC members for their dedicated time and commitment to keep the GIC active with very good outcomes. I look forward to another successful year of GIC and AAPG.

Group Insurance

The function of the Committee on Group Insurance is to maintain a liaison with the broker and administrator of the Association's group insurance programs, to audit the broker's annual report and to supervise management of dividends that accrue. The committee reviews existing programs and requests new insurance plans to meet the changing needs of the membership.

The GeoCare Insurance Benefits Program has been providing a valued service to AAPG members for more 50 years and will continue to do so into the future.

Including AAPG, the following societies are members of the Group Plan: Society of Petroleum Engineers (SPE), American Association of Professional Landmen (AAPL), Association of Environmental and Engineering Geologists (AEG), American Institute of Professional Geologists (AIPG), Council of Petroleum Accounts Societies (COPAS), Environmental and Engineering Geophysical Society (EEGS), Geological Society of Washington (GSW), Society of Exploration Geophysicists (SEG), Society for Sedimentary Geology (SEPM), and the Society of Economic Geologists (SEG).

The GeoCare Program currently offers the following plans for the benefit of our membership: (1) GeoCare benefits insurance exchange (a private medical insurance exchange); (2) life plans (term life, first to die life, guaranteed term life, 10year level term life and high limit accidental death and dismemberment); (3) disability income plan; (4) supplemental insurance plans (cancer expense plan, dental plan, in-hospital plan, long term care plan and the Medicare supplement plan); (5) property and casualty insurance plans (auto and motorcycle, home, and personal liability umbrella coverage); (6) annuities; (7) best benefits discount medical plan; (8) GeoCare international program; and

(9) identity theft assistance. additional programs are being investigated for possible addition in the future.

Association Group Insurance Administrators (AGIA) serves the committee as the general administrator for most of our programs as well as our broker.

The continued weak business climate in the industry has negatively impacted the GeoCare Program with reductions in renewals and new certificates issued. The recent Department of Labor ruling permitting association health plans was overturned by a court ruling as being not permitted under The Patient Protection and Affordability Act of 2010 (PPACA). Plans to initiate a new medical plan were put on hold.

GeoCare has moved to an opt-in process for their introductory programs to new members (under the age of 50 who are United States residents), which includes the one year \$30,000 term life plan (at no cost for their first year) and the disability income plan (at no cost for their first six months), which provides \$600/month for 24 months. After the introductory period, new members may choose to extend either plan at prevailing rates.

The GeoCare International Program was developed to meet the needs of expatriate members who are living or working

overseas including United States members working and/or residing overseas, those residing outside the country in which they have citizenship or a passport, and key local nationals living in countries other than the United States or Canada.

The personal lines plans include insurance for a member's automobile, home, motorcycle, and/or condominium, as well as a personal liability umbrella coverage, which provides protection for members in the event of a claim for damages exceeding the limits of an existing policy.

As of the end of June 2019, the GeoCare program had 9430 certificates (including no-cost intro policies) in force with a total annual premium of \$5,527,349.

Past and future changes in the insurance marketplace create many challenges to the GeoCare program. However, the GeoCare insurance program continues to provide the best benefits available for our members. Imperial Barrel Award

The 2019 Imperial Barrel Award (IBA) competition went off without a hitch for the 13th year in a row. This year the program attracted 124 approved teams comprised of 691 students and faculty advisors. Of these teams, 19 were from

universities that had never participated in IBA from the Africa, Asia Pacific, Europe, Latin America and Caribbean, and Middle East regions. Eleven teams earned the privilege of representing their region or section at the Global Finals held in San Antonio on May 18. In addition to the top three awards, the committee added two additional categories that highlighted teams who excelled in creativity and innovation, or teamwork. We had our first all-female team win an award at the global finals – Sultan Qaboos University from the Middle East Region. Also, Ain Shams University from the Africa Region won the first IBA award for their region in 13 years of competition. Winners are listed on the IBA website at www.iba.aapg.org.

To provide more training material to the participants, the committee and AAPG IT department collaborated on updating the resources page on the IBA website. Fred Schroeder made the largest contribution to the training material. Schroeder recorded a lecture series that is posted on the IBA website and provided live webinars that consisted of three lectures, given at two times to enable multiple time zones to participate. These live sessions reached more than 300 participants, in addition to the views that the recorded series received. The IBA Committee is dedicated to further improve this new resource by adding subtitles to all of the videos the help students that have English as a second, third, etc., language.

Sponsorship for 2019 was close to \$475,000 from a broad range of companies and societies, resulting in a small surplus. All but two Regions and Sections were able to cover their costs, some Regions and Sections had large surpluses. For 2020 we will be asking all Sections and Regions to reduce their costs to 80% of their 2019 spend. Cost reduction ideas that will be implemented in the 2020 IBA include (1) holding semifinal competitions at least seven weeks prior to global finals to save on travel costs; (2) consideration of virtual competitions for Region, sub-Region, and Section competitions; and (3) seeking out competition venues at E&P companies to save costs for facility use.

The IBA Committee is working on enhancing the experience for all participants. We've made changes to the automatically generated email received upon registration. The most significant addition is adding a cap on the number of teams within a Section or Region. We've discussed the representation of international schools at the global finals. Currently, six international schools earn the opportunity to compete against six schools

from the United States. The level of competition the teams face varies across the Sections and Regions. We are thinking of ways to "level the playing field," and will propose changes to the global finals structure, if well-reasoned and necessary.

We have many new faces on the committee compared to two years ago, each of them bringing passion and energy to the IBA. Former committee chair Kristen Wooden left the IBA in a position to succeed. The new committee cochairs Afton Van Zandt and Karl Bloor have picked up where Kristen left off, and are heading into a second year with a strong committee ready to kick off the 2020 competition. Karl and Afton would like to thank the volunteers on the committee, coordinators, judges, faculty advisors, mentors, AAPG, and AAPG Foundation for enabling this tremendous experiential learning program. Finally, the IBA committee would like to thank the sponsors who make the IBA program possible. Sponsorship of IBA gives students an opportunity to work with well and seismic data, and to build the necessary skills to succeed in the oil and gas industry. You can catch the 2020 global finals on June 6, during the AAPG Annual Convention and Exhibition in Houston.

Investment

The AAPG Investment Committee reviewed the investments from inception to June 30, 2019. The new manager Vanguard took charge on November 13, 2018, with AAPG's initial investment of \$9,348,202. On June 30, 2019 the net asset value of the portfolio was \$10,081,728, a gain from inception of 7.8%. The gain year to date is 15.7% and the internal rate of return from inception is 13.9%. Currently the portfolio is invested two-thirds in domestic equities and one-third international equities. The Investment Committee decided to continue with this policy. Currently we have some \$3,156,000 in a money market fund, which has been held separately to cover various obligations such as employee pension obligations. All the obligations have been settled so we are now going to transfer \$2,000,000 to Vanguard over a phase in period to increase our equity holdings. The balance will be held in money market funds outside of Vanguard. At the beginning of June 30, 2018 the net asset value was \$16,304, 797. Some \$3,000,000 was used to cover the pension obligations.

The Investment Committee has been reorganized with John Brock as chair and Bryant Fulk as vice-chair from the former committee and four additional members being the current and past presidents and the current and past treasurers.

Preservation of Geoscience Data

The AAPG Preservation of Geoscience Data Committee last met in person at the Annual Convention and Exposition in San Antonio, Texas, on May 21, 2019. Nine people attended in person and two attended by phone call in.

Main goals and objectives for the committee that were discussed during the meeting and represent ongoing activity and communications during the year included the following.

- Coordination with US Geological Survey National Geological and Geophysical Data Preservation Program. This program is managed by Lindsey Powers from the Denver office. It is a national program that provides funds to state geological surveys to manage and preserve geological and geophysical data and sample materials. They continue to support a major effort to developing digital resources as well as maintaining physical samples. They are currently promoting request for additional funding from Congress for data preservation.
- 2. Continue to compile a reference database of geoscience data and sample repositories throughout the United States with contact information and web page links. There should also be information as to the data, samples, cores, and other geoscience materials available at these repositories. Two such databases are now available and plan to be posted on the Committee's web site. One is a listing by state of the geoscience facilities in the United States that archive geoscience data and samples. It is in an Excel spreadsheet format and includes the state name, repository name, owner of the facility, physical address, website, contact person (email and phone number) and inventory of the collections in the USGS National Catalogue (National Geological and Geophysical Data Preservation Program - NGGDPP). This data set also includes a number of national/federal geoscience data repositories that house material from numerous states or the offshore

seabed. Harrison has shared a draft compilation with the committee and we plan to post on the Committee's web page when finalized.

A second spreadsheet prepared by Beverly DeJanett listing global geoscience repositories along with those in the United States. This database was prepared for the Deep Carbon Observatory and funded by the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation, but is being made available to the Committee as an additional source of information about geoscience data preservation.

- 3. Planning is underway to revise the Committee's brochure on preservation of geoscience data that was prepared years ago by vice-chair Patrick Gooding. Current idea is to have it as a digital document to save the cost of printing.
- 4. Discussions and possible recommendations for digital archiving of geoscience specimens, cores and samples. Several examples of core photography were discussed and their evaluation is ongoing. Preparation of a description of some of the technology and possible best practices manual is in progress. Developing a relationship with other initiatives such as Open Earth Initiative and Earth Cubed are being investigated.
- 5. The Committee is working to reach out to other professional organizations and build bridges relating to geoscience

data preservation. The committee will support a data preservation session at the 2019 annual GSA meeting in Phoenix, Arizona. Committee member Denise Hills is involved with the GSA activities.

Publications Pipeline

We had another busy year continuing with our mission to serve as a pipeline between book donors and geoscience universities worldwide. During the fiscal year we held 11 formal meetings as well as multiple work sessions dedicated to sorting, inventorying, boxing, and palletizing used books, journals, atlases, and maps that have been donated to the Publication Pipeline Committee by individuals and institutions. We completed three major shipments amounting to 28 pallets (a total of 19 tons) to South Africa and Senegal, and have been since April 2019 preparing a large shipment of 20 pallets for Tanzania.

The first major shipment consisted of 14 pallets containing the AAPG Foundation library. It was delivered to the University of the Western Cape in South Africa in November 2018, in time to be recognized at the International Conference and

Exhibition by past AAPG president Denise Cox. This shipment was funded by AAPG and was greatly facilitated in South Africa by PetroSA.


The second shipment of 10 pallets arrived in Dakar, Senegal in June and was delivered to the Institut National du Pétrole et du Gaz (INPG). This was followed a few weeks later by a third shipment consisting of four pallets for the University of Cheikh Anta Diop and INPG. These donations were made possible through the generous assistance and financial support of Africa Fortesa Corporation under the direction of executive chairman Rogers Beall.

In preparation for these shipments to Senegal, earlier in May we received at our Houston warehouse several distinguished visitors (see photo) including Youhanidou Wane Ba, commercial specialist, Embassy of the United States in Dakar; Aguibou BA, director general of the National Institute of Petroleum and Gas; Ousmane Ndiaye, permanent secretary of COS PetroGaz (president's office) and chairman of the INPG; Cheikh Tidiane Ndiaye, director general for Fortesa international Sénégal; Joseph Medou, director of exploration, PetroSen; and Rogers Beall, executive chairman, Africa Fortessa Corporation.

The committee is currently preparing a shipment of 20 pallets for the University of Dodoma in Tanzania, under the generous sponsorship of Equinor. This donation contains near-complete collections of the *AAPG Bulletin* and *GSA Bulletin* as well as other journals and books including surplus AAPG publications.

We continue to receive a steady stream of donations from retiring geoscientists and various institutions including the Oklahoma Geological Survey. Our biggest challenge continues to be finding worthy recipients of these collections and, most importantly, corporate financial support to cover shipping costs. Possible future recipients include universities in Egypt, Uganda, and Kenya. We are currently exploring ways of finding potential sponsors and of recognizing present and past contributors.

Our most important assets are our active members, volunteers who dedicate several hours every month working on committee-related activities. Our current active roster consists of the following individuals: Jose Guzman (chair), Martin Cassidy (cochair), Bruce Cain (treasurer), Chuck Caughey (secretary), Gerrit Wind, Dan Pratt, Peter Sadler, Katy Foltz, Jon Blickwede, David

Super Basin Initiative

This is a report of the Super Basin Ad Hoc committee, activities for FY 2019. During this time, eight super basin themed events were held with participation by more than 3,000 attendees. This report includes additional context and background. This committee has a steering committee of 25 individuals with global perspectives.

Every 15-20 years AAPG holds Pratt conferences designed to take stock of industry knowledge and plan for future strategic directions. The first conference convened in 1984 "Future Petroleum Provinces of the World." The second conference in 2000, "Petroleum Provinces of the Twenty First Century,"

focused on mainly new areas. In 2018-2020, at the dawn of AAPG's second century, an energy renaissance in abundant and affordable energy has reset our thinking. A mood of optimism has replaced fear of shortage and "peak oil" decline. While we continue to explore new frontiers, industry has returned to the world's richest petroleum bearing basins with an all-out effort to optimize extensive infrastructure using new technology. This is the advent of super basins and impetus for a new series of conferences.

While previous Pratt conferences produced Memoirs 40 and 76, super basins conferences are leaving a legacy of multimedia presentations that can be accessed globally through the AAPG website.

What is a super basin? A basin with 5 BBOE produced and yet to produce, many pays and plays, and substantial infrastructure (Super Basins, Bob Fryklund, Pete Stark, IHS market research paper, 2016). In contrast to rank frontier exploration, super basins are well-known basins where technology is the game changer. Super basins combine geoscience architecture, commerciality, infrastructure, and above-ground issues in a holistic review. While there are about 900 petroleum bearing basins around the world and 130 or so that qualify as super basins, comparing and contrasting the world's top 30 super basins enables anticipation of new resources by looking for opportunities in all basins.

Onshore basins with unconventional resources are benefitting from engineering breakthroughs in stimulation and recovery.

Offshore basins with conventional resources are being revitalized below salt and other barriers by enhanced seismic imaging. Geoscience plays a key role and AAPG members are leading the way.

What can we learn from super basins? Each has at least one active world class petroleum systems where petroleum modeling can be a powerful predictor of "yet to find resources." The prototype architecture consists of rich source rocks buried by a thick sedimentary section (commonly basin fill clinoforms), capped by a regional seal or series of seals, in a nonleaky setting. Thus, passive margins, rift and intracratonic basins hold two-thirds of world's giant fields. Super basins like California and Saudi Arabia have many structural traps but few stratigraphic traps. These types of observations are examples upon which exploration programs can be built. The goal of super basin forums is to reveal comparative insights for actionable intelligence.

The Permian Basin is the prototype onshore unconventional super basin. It possesses key geological fundamentals in abundance. In addition, the Permian Basin and other North American basins are a fertile crescent and cradle of technology. They possess critical factors for innovation: private mineral ownership, a strongly networked community, service company partnerships, and immediate rewards for risk taking. The Permian Basin offers hardwon lessons from more than a decade that include addressing needs for transport, water source and disposal, sand shortage, and gas/oil ratios (from source rock and well interference). Building on this experience, other basins can leapfrog

ahead. Where might other "Permian Basins" emerge?

Our industry is making great progress to improve energy, environment, economics and global security. We are rebalancing our energy portfolio by replacing clean burning natural gas for less efficient energy sources. Alternate energy innovation is occurring, but hydrocarbons have, are, and will play a dominant role in global prosperity for generations to come. The super basin renaissance, just like AAPG's second century, is just beginning.

Technology transfer




AAPG Bulletin Initiative

This annual report of the Young Professionals Special Interest Group aims to provide a high-level overview of the activities that were organized during the 2018-2019 fiscal year. For further details, feel free to contact the SIG leadership committee chairs.

The 8th Young Professionals Leadership Summit was hosted in Houston, Texas, on October 19-20, 2018. Thirteen YP from around the world discussed the way forward for YP initiatives in AAPG. The meeting consisted of sessions where YP attendees reviewed and discussed the major focus areas of the YP SIG, including the AAPG value proposition to YP, communication, member recruitment and retention, and the future of YP within AAPG. The participants also discussed the decision by AAPG HQ to halt funding of the YPLS. During the two-day event, the YP also held a couple of joint sessions with the Student Chapter Leadership Summit that was happening concurrently, as well as attended a networking event and dinner with the advisory council.

At the Annual Convention and Exhibition in San Antonio on May 19-22, 2019, the Young Professionals organized a packed program. Sunday, the popular meet-and-greet drew a crowd of nearly 200 people prior to the opening ceremony and icebreaker reception. Later that evening, the YP networking reception drew more than 100 people for lively discussions with new and old friends.

Communication with the membership is another key task of the SIG leadership committee which we accomplish through our monthly YP Connect article in the AAPG EXPLORER, as well as by maintaining an active online presence on Facebook, LinkedIn, Twitter,

Instagram and the AAPG website. This year, the committee has focused on updating the membership on the SIG's major focus areas. YP Connect articles like "Developing new ideas to Improve AAPG's value proposition" directly address the many initiatives coming from the YP SIG to grow, engage, and retain members.

Last but not least, the committee has an important role as a conduit for sharing information between the Sections and Regions about the activities that are organized by the global network of YP chapters, as well as at Section, Region and local society events. AAPG Constitution and Bylaws

Constitution

As amended June 25, 2006

ARTICLE I. NAME

This Association, which is incorporated under the laws of the State of Colorado, shall be called "The American Association of Petroleum Geologists."

ARTICLE II. PURPOSES

The purposes of this Association are to advance the science of geology, especially as it relates to petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to promote the technology of exploring for, finding, and producing these materials in an economically and environmentally sound manner; to foster the spirit of scientific research throughout its membership; to disseminate information relating to the geology and the associated technology of petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to inspire and maintain a high standard of professional conduct on the part of its members; to provide the public with means to recognize adequately trained and professionally responsible geologists; and to advance the professional well- being of its members.

ARTICLE III. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1.

The members of this Association shall consist of persons concerned with the professional applications of the geological science.

SECTION 2.

Various classifications of memberships and the qualifications thereof shall be established by the Bylaws of the Association.

ARTICLE IV. CODE OF ETHICS

SECTION 1. General Principles

- (a) Geology is a profession, and the privilege of professional practice requires professional morality and professional responsibility.
- (b) Honesty, integrity, loyalty, fairness, impartiality, candor, fidelity to trust, and inviolability of confidence are incumbent upon every member as professional obligations.
- (c) Each member shall be guided by high standards of business ethics, personal honor, and professional conduct. The word member" as used throughout this code includes all classes of membership.

SECTION 2. Relation of Members to the Public

- (a) Members shall not make false, misleading, or unwarranted statements, representations or claims in regard to professional matters, nor shall they engage in false or deceptive advertising
- (b) Members shall not permit the publication or use of their reports or maps for any unsound or illegitimate undertakings.
- (c) Members shall not give professional opinions, make reports or give legal testimony without being as thoroughly informed as reasonably required.

SECTION 3. Relation of Members to Employers and Clients

- (a) Members shall disclose to prospective employers or clients the existence of any pertinent competitive or conflicting interests
- (b) Members shall not use or divulge any employer's or client's confidential information without their permission and shall avoid conflicts of interest that may arise from information gained during geological investigations.

SECTION 4. Relation of Members to One Another

- (a) Members shall not falsely or maliciously attempt to injure the reputation or business of others.
- (b) Members shall freely recognize the work done by others, avoid plagiarism, and avoid the acceptance of credit due others.
- (c) Members shall endeavor to cooperate with others in the profession and shall encourage the ethical dissemination of geological knowledge.

SECTION 5. Duty to the Association

- (a) Members of the Association shall aid in preventing the election to membership of those who are unqualified or do not meet the standards set forth in this Code of Ethics.
- (b) By applying for or continuing membership in the Association each member agrees to uphold the ethical standards set forth in this Code of Ethics.
- (c) Members shall not use AAPG membership to imply endorsement, recommendation, or approval by the Association of specific projects or proposals.

SECTION 6. Discipline for Violations of Standards

Members violating any standard prescribed in this Article shall be subject to discipline as provided by the Bylaws.

ARTICLE V. GOVERNMENT

The government of this Association shall be vested in seven (7) elected officers, an Executive Committee, a House of Delegates, and an Advisory Council. The composition of each body, the manner selection, the terms of office, the specific duties, responsibilities, and other matters relevant to such bodies and officers shall be as provided in the Bylaws of this Association. Any responsibility and authority of government of this Association not otherwise specified in these governing documents shall be reserved to the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VI. DISPOSITION OF ASSETS

The American Association of Petroleum Geologists is a non-profit organization. In the event of the dissolution of the Association, the Association shall distribute any assets remaining after the discharge of all liabilities, for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes in strict compliance with exemption provided under Section 501 (c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. It is recognized that, under these circumstances, no member of the Association shall have any right or interest in or to the property or assets of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. BYLAWS

The Bylaws, consisting of fourteen (14) articles as appended hereto, are hereby adopted and may be amended, enlarged, or reduced as provided in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE VIII. AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Mail, Electronic Mail or Other Suitable Ballot by Members Amendments to this Constitution may be made by a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of the members of this Association responding by mail, electronic mail, or other suitable ballot.

SECTION 2. Proposal of Amendments

Such amendments may be proposed by the following:

- (a) Resolution by the Executive Committee;
- (b) Resolution by a special constitutional committee appointed by the President;
- (c) Resolution of the House of Delegates;
- (d) A proposal in writing signed by any fifty (50) members of the Association.

All such resolutions or proposals must be submitted to, and action must be taken during, the annual meeting of the House of Delegates of this Association, as provided in the Bylaws and in conformance with Section 3 of this Article.

SECTION 3. Legality of Amendments

The legality of all amendments shall be determined by the Executive Committee with advice of counsel prior to consideration by the House of Delegates. In the event that a proposed amendment is revised by the House of Delegates, such revision will again be referred to the Executive Committee for determination of legality prior to balloting.

SECTION 4. Publication of Amendments

Upon affirmation of legality of the proposed amendments, the Executive Committee shall cause them to be published in the Bulletin or by other suitable means at least two (2) months prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates.

SECTION 5. Voting on Amendments

If any proposed amendment shall be acted upon favorably by simple majority vote of the House of Delegates, the Executive Committee shall arrange for a ballot of members by mail, electronic mail or other suitable means, within sixty (60) days after the annual meeting of the House of Delegates, and two-thirds (2/3) majority favorable vote of the ballots received within sixty (60) days of such mailing, electronic mail or other suitable distribution, shall be sufficient to amend.

BYLAWS

As amended April 2, 2017

ARTICLE I - NAME

This association, which is a Colorado nonprofit corporation recognized by the IRS as anInternal Revenue Code section 501(c)(6) organization, shall be called "The American Association of Petroleum Geologists," also referred to as the Association, or AAPG.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSES

The purposes of this Association are to advance the science of geology, especially as it relates to petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to promote the technology of exploring for, finding, and producing these materials in an economically and environmentally sound manner; to foster the spirit of scientific research throughout its

membership; to disseminate information relating to the geology and the associated technology of petroleum, natural gas, other subsurface fluids, and mineral resources; to inspire and maintain a high standard of professional conduct on the part of its members; to provide the public with means to recognize adequately trained and professionally responsible geologists; and to advance the professional well-being of its members.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS

SECTION 1. Membership Classifications

The three membership classifications shall be Members, students, and associates. All members shall be entitled to receive a copy of the *Bulletin* and *Explorer*. Except for headings, where the word "Member" is used in these bylaws with a capital letter, it shall refer to the specific membership category of Member. Where used without a capital letter, it shall be a generic use to refer to all those who hold any category of membership in AAPG. Headings shall refer to specific uses within that section.

- A. Members
- 1. Persons applying to become Members of AAPG shall:
- a. Be engaged in the practice or teaching of geology;
- b. Hold a Bachelor's, Master's, or Ph.D. in geological science, (including, but not limited to, geology, geophysics, earth science, geological engineering or environmental geoscience) from a college or university of acceptable academic standards; and
- c. Have a minimum of one (1) year of experience in the practice or teaching of geological science. The executive committee may waive this degree requirement in favor of adequate professional experience and standing in the profession.
- 2. Members may hold office, vote in Association affairs, sponsor membership applications, and refer to themselves as Members of the Association.
- a. All Member applicants shall submit an application form authorized by the executive committee that includes the endorsement of one Member in good standing, attesting to the applicant's training and experience. The executive committee shall determine all questions of eligibility, except that the executive committee may not waive the endorsement or professional experience requirements.
- b. The executive committee shall publish the names of approved applicants along with the names of their sponsors. If no objections to the application are received within sixty days, the executive committee shall notify the applicant of his or her acceptance. Objections must include a full statement of the circumstances on which the objection is based and be signed by the Member raising the objection. The executive committee shall take the objection under consideration and make a final determination as to eligibility at its sole discretion.
- 3. Emeritus Members Members may request emeritus status when they have reached the age of sixty-five (65), are in good standing, and have been members of any classification for thirty years, including time spent in military service. The request shall be sent to the executive director. Emeritus Members shall retain all privileges as Members, but shall pay 50% of the Member dues.
- 4. Honorary Members Recipients of the Sidney Powers Memorial Medal Award and other members who have contributed distinguished service to the cause of petroleum geology may be granted honorary membership by the executive committee. Honorary members shall be granted all of the privileges of Members, and shall not be required to pay dues.

B. Students

Any student majoring in geology or in a field of study related to or generally associated with geology at a college or university of acceptable academic standards may apply for student membership. Student membership shall terminate twenty-four (24) months after termination of academic enrollment and student members will be reclassified as associates.

C. Associates

Any person not qualified for any other class of membership, who is a graduate of a college or university of acceptable academic standards and whose employment is associated with geological science, may apply to be an associate. The executive committee may waive this degree requirement in favor of adequate professional experience and standing in the profession.

SECTION 2. Dues

A. Dues shall be billed and payable in advance of the fiscal year in accordance with a schedule established by the executive committee. The fiscal year shall begin on July 1 and end on June 30. Written notification by mail, electronic mail, or other suitable means shall be provided to each Member, student and associate before July 1 of each year, stating the amount of annual dues owed. Dues shall not be refundable. Those previously designated as life members shall not be required to pay dues.

B. Dues may not exceed the following: Member - \$125.00 Emeritus Member - \$62.50

Student - \$10.00

Associate - \$125.00

C. Dues for Members and associates shall be billed in accordance to the following three levels of gross annual income:

Level 1 – Annual income greater than \$50,000;

Level 2 – Annual income greater than \$25,000 but not more than \$50,000; and

Level 3 – Annual income of \$25,000 or less.

Level 2 dues shall be one-half of Level 1 dues; Level 3 dues shall be one-fourth of Level 1 dues; provided that annual dues may not be less than \$20.00 for any level. A Member or an associate whose annual income is in Level 2 or Level 3 may pay dues that correspond with any higher level of annual income. The executive committee may provide for access to the Bulletin and the Explorer by different means for persons paying different levels of dues.

D. Dues for Members and associates may not be changed more than 20% in any given year.

SECTION 3. Membership Meetings

The Association shall hold at least one stated meeting of its members each year, at a time and place designated by the executive committee.

SECTION 4. Loss of Membership

A. Any member may resign at any time from the Association; such resignation shall be in writing and shall be accepted by the executive committee.

B. Any member whose dues are in arrears for more than sixty days but less than one year shall be suspended from membership. Any member whose dues are in arrears for more than one year shall forfeit membership.

C. Any member who resigns, who forfeits membership for non-payment of dues, or who is expelled for ethical reasons shall cease to have any rights in the Association and shall not incur further indebtedness to the Association. D. Any person who has been removed from membership, except by expulsion, may be reinstated by unanimous vote of the executive committee, upon fulfillment of such requirements as may be established by the executive committee. A person who has been expelled may be reinstated as provided for in the AAPG Disciplinary Code.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. Officers

The officers of this Association shall be a president, presidentelect, vice president – sections, vice president-regions, secretary, treasurer, and editor.

A. President

The president shall be the chief executive officer and spokesperson for the Association on all matters pertaining to the public; shall serve as chair of the executive committee, shall appoint the members of all committees in accordance with these bylaws; and shall appoint delegates to cooperating organizations to represent the Association.

B. President-elect

The president-elect shall serve as a member of the executive committee, shall present a budget for the ensuing year to the executive committee, and succeed to the office of president following the term as president-elect.

C. Vice president-sections

The vice president-sections shall, with his or her other duties, concern himself or herself with the activities of the Association in respect to United States sections.

D. Vice president-regions

The vice president-regions shall, with his or her other duties, concern himself or herself with the activities of the Association in respect to its international regions.

E. Secretary

The secretary shall be responsible for recording the actions of the executive committee; shall keep possession of the corporate seal and affix the same; and, subject to executive committee approval, have policy oversight of all non-technical and non-peer reviewed publications and communications. The secretary shall perform other duties as may be directed by the executive committee.

F. Treasurer

The treasurer shall supervise the receipt of all funds and, under the direction of the executive committee, be responsible for all disbursements of funds of the Association; serve as an ex-officio member of the committee on investments; give bond, the amount of which shall be determined by the executive committee; make the annual report as treasurer; and perform such other duties as directed by the executive committee.

G. Editor

The editor shall have general supervision of and final authority in soliciting, accepting, and rejecting all material on technical subjects for publication; have policy oversight and responsibility for editorial content of all technical and peerreviewed publications; submit an annual report of editorial activities to the executive committee; and, with the approval of the executive committee, appoint volunteer editors as deemed necessary.

SECTION 2. Terms of Office

A. Terms of office shall be from July 1 to June 30. No officer may serve a successive term.

B. The terms of office for the president-elect and president shall be for one year. The president-elect shall succeed to the office of president following the term as president-elect.

C. The vice president-sections, the vice president-regions, the secretary, and the treasurer shall serve two-year staggered terms. The terms of the vice president- sections and the treasurer shall begin in even numbered years and the terms of the vice president-regions and the secretary shall begin in odd numbered years.

D. The term of office for the editor shall be three years.

SECTION 3. Eligibility

A. No person may hold more than one of the following positions during the same term:

- Association officer;
- House of delegates officer;
- Immediate past chair of the house of delegates;
- Division president; and
- Elected advisory council member.

B. In addition, no person currently serving in the aforementioned positions may become a candidate during the term of office or for one year immediately following such term, and no past president may hold any of these positions for a period of three years following a term as president.

C. A candidate for the office of vice president-sections must reside within the United States and be a Member of a section.

D. A candidate for the office of vice president-regions must reside outside of the United States and be a Member of a region.

SECTION 4. Election

A. The advisory council shall annually recommend two or more candidates for each of the available offices, and shall report to the executive committee by November 15 of each year.

B. The executive committee shall approve the ballot, placing two candidates for each available office. To change the order of candidates or the office for which a candidate is nominated by the advisory council shall require the affirmative vote of at least five members of the executive committee. If the executive committee changes the office for which a candidate is nominated, such candidate shall be given the opportunity to decline such candidacy.

C. Candidates shall be announced to members via email on or before December 1. Additional nominations may be made by written petition or email of fifty (50) or more Members in good standing received by the executive director at Association headquarters not later than January 31.

D. The names of candidates shall be published in the *Explorer* or by other suitable means by January 1. Petition candidates will be announced no later than February 15.

E. The executive committee shall then prepare a ballot, which may be a printed, electronic, or other suitable ballot, listing the candidates for each office, which shall be distributed to each Member on or before April 1. Ballots must be returned by May 15. The ballot committee shall count the ballots promptly after May 15 and report the results to the president. A majority of all votes cast for an office shall be necessary for election. In case of a tie vote the executive committee shall cast one (1) additional deciding vote.

F. In there are more than two (2) candidates for any office, then the election shall be by preferential voting, and voters shall mark their preferences in order. If no candidate receives a majority after the first choice ballots have been counted, the ballots for the candidate with the least number of first place

votes shall then be allocated by the second choice. This process shall be repeated until one of the candidates receives a majority vote.

G. The vote totals for all elections conducted by this Association shall not be released except upon written approval of all candidates for that specific office. In such case, the results will be released to each of those candidates. Subsequent disclosure of the results shall also require the specific written approval of each candidate for that office.

SECTION 5. Vacancies

Vacancies shall be filled as follows:

- 1. A vacancy in the office of president shall be filled by the vice president whose term of office started earliest.
- 2. A vacancy in the office of president-elect, vice presidentsections, or vice president-regions shall be filled by a special election called by the executive committee. Any such ballot may consist of any combination of mail, electronic mail, or other suitable means.
- 3. A vacancy occurring in the office of secretary, treasurer, or editor shall be filled by the unsuccessful candidate for that office in the most recent election. If there was more than one unsuccessful candidate for that office consenting to serve if elected, the vacancy will be filled by a special election, which may be by preferential balloting. If no candidates are willing to serve if elected, the executive committee may fill such vacancy.

SECTION 6. Officer Eligibility for Nominations and Awards

A. No officer may be selected for an honor or award by the executive committee during and for one year immediately following the term, except for an honor or award that has been determined by an impartial convention judging process.

B. No candidate for an officer or position may be selected for any honor or award given by any Association component during the period of their candidacy, unless the honor or award has been announced prior to the announcement of their candidacy, or determined by an impartial convention judging process.

ARTICLE V - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. Composition

The executive committee shall be composed of the following:

- President
- President-elect
- Vice president-sections
- Vice president-regions
- Secretary
- Treasurer
- Editor
- Chair, house of delegates

SECTION 2. Authority

The executive committee shall serve as the Association board of directors, and shall have the general executive control and management of the affairs and funds of this Association. The executive committee shall also:

- Have sole responsibility for all matters regarding the external affairs of this Association;
- Designate the time and place of the annual meeting of the Association
- Supervise the election of officers and filling of vacancies;
- Determine the adequacy of applicant qualifications and classifications;

- Maintain a headquarters and staff;
- Accept, create, and administer the funds and accounts of this Association, appointing trustees to manage such funds;
 - Establish such fiscal policies as may be appropriate;
- Serve as an appeal authority in all matters involving grievance proceedings and professional certification of members; and
- Perform such other administrative duties as required to accomplish the objects and purposes of this Association. Any responsibility and authority of the governance of this Association not otherwise specified in these governing documents shall be reserved to the executive committee.

SECTION 3. Executive Committee Meetings

A. The executive committee shall meet immediately before the annual meeting of the house of delegates, and at other times designated by the executive committee, and at the call of the president. A quorum shall consist of four (4) members.

B. Meetings may be held under any such conditions, including action without a meeting, as authorized under the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Corporations Act, provided that no proxy voting shall be allowed, nor shall alternates be allowed to participate in executive committee meetings.

C. Five (5) days notice of regular or special meetings of the executive committee shall be given, which shall include the date, time, place, and, if a special meeting, the purpose of the meeting. Notice shall be given, and may also be waived, in any manner permitted by the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Act.

D. The members of the executive committee shall be indemnified by the Association and shall be relieved from personal liability in all matters regarding the Association to the full extent as permitted under Internal Revenue Code section 501(c)(6) and any other pertinent federal income law or regulation, and to the full extent authorized by the Colorado Revised Nonprofit Act.

E. The executive committee shall have the authority, by a twothirds vote, to amend the articles of incorporation of the Association.

SECTION 4. Executive Director

The executive director shall be the chief administrative official of the Association, shall have the authority to execute contracts on behalf of the Association, and shall have charge of the Association headquarters and staff personnel as authorized by the executive committee. The executive director shall be appointed by, and serve at the pleasure of, the executive committee and be under the personal direction of the president. The executive director may not be an officer of the Association or a member of the executive committee.

The executive director shall also:

- Implement the policies of the executive committee;
- Receive all official notices to the Association;
- Be responsible for the physical custody of all official documents held in repository at Association headquarters; and
- Assist in the work of all committees to ensure the effectiveness of the activities of this Association.

ARTICLE VI - HOUSE OF DELEGATES

SECTION 1. Composition

A. The house of delegates shall be composed of delegates representing the affiliated societies and international regions. Members of the executive committee, former chairs of the house of delegates, and past presidents of the Association more than three (3) years out of office shall be non-voting members,

but are not prohibited from serving as delegates if elected. Officers of the house of delegates shall be voting members of the house of delegates.

B. Officers

- 1. The officers of the house of delegates shall be a chair, a chair-elect and a secretary/editor. The house of delegates shall elect the chair-elect and the secretary/editor at its annual meeting from among the delegates who have served at least one year. The term of office shall be one year, commencing July 1. The chair-elect shall assume the office of chair following the term as chair- elect.
- 2. A vacancy in the office of chair shall be filled for the remainder of that term by the chair-elect, followed by a term as chair. A vacancy in the office of chair-elect shall be filled by the secretary/editor. A vacancy in the office of secretary/editor shall be filled by appointment by the chair.

C. Delegates

- 1. All delegates must be Members in good standing. The house of delegates shall be the sole judge of the eligibility of its members to serve as delegates or officers of the house
- 2. Each United States affiliated society shall be entitled to one delegate, plus one delegate for every additional seventy of its Members or major fraction thereof. Each international region shall be entitled to one delegate, plus one delegate for every additional seventy of its Members or major fraction thereof, provided that no international region shall have fewer than one delegate for each affiliated society within the region.
- 3. Delegates shall be elected by the Members of each society and region. Members may only vote in their home society or region. Association Members residing in the United States and not having a home society may be assigned, for the purpose of voting in delegate elections only, to the nearest United States affiliated society upon request to that society. Association Members residing outside of the United States shall be assigned to the international region in which they reside, and shall vote in that region in elections for delegates unless claiming a United States affiliated society or another region as their home society or region.

4. The Members of each international region shall elect one or more delegates from among the Association Members of each affiliated society within that international region. Any Members who wish to become candidates for delegate shall file a written request with their affiliated society or international region.

5. Delegates shall be elected for three-year terms. Terms of office shall begin on July 1 following their election.

6. Vacancies in office may be filled, or alternate delegates may be assigned, from among the candidates not receiving a sufficient number of votes from the previous election, and in order of the total number of votes received. The Members from the affiliated society or international region may also appoint alternate delegates and fill any vacancies. The names of alternate delegates must be received in writing by the AAPG headquarters office at least fifteen days prior to the meeting of the house of delegates for which they have been appointed.

7. Should a term of a delegate from a society expire and a society fail to elect a new delegate sixty days before the annual meeting, the president of the section shall appoint a delegate to serve for that term.

SECTION 2. Meetings

The house of delegates shall meet at least once each year during the annual meeting of the Association. No proxy votes

shall be allowed. A quorum shall be a majority of all qualified delegates or alternates elected.

SECTION 3. Authority

All of the legislative function of this Association shall be vested in a house of delegates.

SECTION 4. Duties of Delegates

Delegates shall:

- Serve as representatives of the members in their society or international region;
- Familiarize themselves with the Association's governing documents:
- Acquaint themselves with the Association's current policies and programs;
- Keep their alternates and the leaders of their society and region informed of the Association's program of activities, especially with regard to cooperative participation and service:
- Process requests from the executive committee for information regarding eligibility of applicants for membership in the Association;
- Function as local certification committee members and process requests from the board of certification for information regarding applicants for certification by the Association;
- Actively solicit applications from eligible geologists for membership in this Association; and
- Recognize the obligation to attend all meetings of the house of delegates during their terms, and to perform their duties to the best of their ability.

ARTICLE VII - ADVISORY COUNCIL

SECTION 1. Composition

A. The advisory council shall be composed of one elected councilor from each section or region with up to 3,000 Members plus one elected councilor for each additional 3,000 Members or fraction thereof, the immediate past chair of the house of delegates, the immediate past president of AAPG, and the chief elected officer of each division. The president immediately prior to the immediate past president of AAPG may elect to serve on the advisory council for up to two years, but if service is declined or discontinued for any reason, service may not be resumed under this clause. The date of record for determining councilor membership shall be November 30 of each year.

B. Unless the immediate past president of AAPG elects to serve as chair, the council shall elect a chair from among the members of the advisory council. The chair shall appoint a recording secretary to take minutes of each meeting.

C. An alternate representative may be designated for an elected advisory council position, who shall be the councilor's immediate predecessor on the advisory council or, if such person is unwilling or unavailable, a current member of that region, section or division shall be designated by its president to serve as the representative for that advisory council meeting or to fill a vacancy.

SECTION 2. Election and Term of Office

A. Councilors shall be elected by ballot by the Members of their respective section or region. There shall be at least two candidates on the ballot for each position. Candidates may be nominated by the respective governing body or by petition of at

least fifty Members of the section or region. Petitions must be delivered to the section or region president at least thirty days prior to the start of the election.

B. The term of office for councilors shall be three years, commencing on July 1. Terms shall be staggered according to a schedule established by the executive committee.

SECTION 3. Duties

A. The advisory council shall:

- Serve as a long range planning body to review the Association's activities and recommend to the executive committee appropriate changes of programs and policies;
- Recommend candidates for Association officers;
- Recommend recipients for all honors and awards as directed by the executive committee;
- Review the relationships among the Association, sections, regions, divisions and other components and recommend adjustments to the executive committee as deemed necessary;
- Continually review the bylaws and recommend changes as deemed necessary; and
- Perform such other service to AAPG as directed by the executive committee.
- B. Five members of the advisory council shall serve as the hearing body in grievance proceedings as provided in the disciplinary code.

SECTION 4. Meetings

The advisory council shall meet at least once each year during the annual meeting of the Association and at the call of the chair. The quorum shall be a majority of its members. The advisory council may also act by mail or electronic means as requested by the executive committee. Proxy voting shall not be allowed.

SECTION 5. Vacancies

Vacancies in councilor positions shall be filled by an election to be held within 120 days of said vacancy.

ARTICLE VIII - COMPONENT GROUPS AND AFFILIATIONS

SECTION 1. Organization

The establishment, composition and dissolution of sections and regions shall be the responsibility of the house of delegates upon recommendation by the executive committee. The internal affairs of such sections and regions shall be administered by each section and region, consistent with the purposes and policies of this Association.

SECTION 2. Sections

A. Sections shall be established within the United States for the purpose of sponsoring technical meetings, publications, and other activities that further the objectives of the Association within the section. Sections shall be geographically organized. The members of sections may be individuals or federated affiliated geological societies.

- B. The sections shall be titled:
- Eastern Section;
- Mid-Continent Section;
- Southwestern Section;
- Gulf Coast Section;
- Rocky Mountain Section; and
- Pacific Section;

SECTION 3. Regions

A. Regions shall be established outside the United States for the purpose of sponsoring technical meetings, publications, and other activities that further the objectives of the Association within the region. Regions shall be geographically organized. The members of regions may be individuals or federated affiliated geological societies.

B. The regions shall be titled:

- Canada Region;
- Latin America and the Caribbean Region;
- Europe Region;
- Africa Region;
- Asia Pacific Region; and
- Middle East Region.

SECTION 4. Technical Divisions

A. Technical divisions may be established by the house of delegates at its annual meeting upon recommendation of the executive committee. A two-thirds vote shall be required to establish or dissolve a technical division. Technical divisions may affiliate with other scientific societies with the approval of the executive committee, and may have their own governing documents provided that they do not conflict with the AAPG bylaws. The executive committee shall determine whether such conflict exists. The executive committee shall be empowered to make arrangements with the officers of the division for the conduct of the business of the division.

B. This Association may establish a technical division to conduct a program of voluntary certification of Members in such professional categories and the awarding of such titles, as approved by the executive committee. Each professional category of certification will be sponsored by a technical division, which need not be the technical division conducting the certification program. Implementing procedures, including the issuance of appropriate certificates, shall be adopted by the technical division conducting the certification program.

SECTION 5. Technical Interest Groups and Special Interest Groups

Technical Interest Groups (TIGs) and Special Interest Groups (SIGs) shall be established, maintained, and dissolved by the executive committee.

SECTION 6. Affiliated and Associated Societies.

This Association may affiliate or associate with societies and other groups whose purposes are complementary to AAPG. Such affiliation or association shall be approved by the house of delegates upon the recommendation of the executive committee.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. Standing Committees

A. There shall be an ethics committee and any other committees established by the executive committee upon recommendation of the advisory council. The executive committee shall annually report to the house of delegates on the establishment or dissolution of any standing committees for that year. A list of standing committees, the charge to each committee, and the names of the chairs or co-chairs, vice-chairs, and committee members of each shall be published annually.

B. The president shall appoint all committee chairs, co-chairs, vice chairs, other committee members and committee

managers, and fill vacancies whenever they occur, except where otherwise specified in these bylaws. The committee manager may or may not be a member of the committee. The executive committee shall determine the number of members of each standing committee, its charges, and may appoint a manager to liaise with the executive committee.

C. Committee members shall serve three year staggered terms, commencing on July 1. Chairs, co-chairs, vice-chairs, and committee managers shall serve a one year term commencing on July 1, and may not serve as such for more than three consecutive years. No co-chair shall have served as chair at any time during the preceding year.

SECTION 2. Ethics Committee

There shall be an ethics committee composed of five members appointed by the executive committee for staggered three-year terms. Members of the ethics committee shall be members of the technical division of the Association charged with conducting the certification programs of members in professional categories. The ethics committee shall investigate ethical complaints and perform other such duties as described in the disciplinary code.

SECTION 3. Special Committees and Delegations

Special committees and delegations shall be authorized by the executive committee for a term of one year. The president shall appoint the members and chairs of special committees and delegations.

SECTION 4. Association Representatives to Non-Association Committees

The executive committee may appoint a member of any classification to serve as AAPC's representative on an outside committee, board or organization. Such service shall not extend for more than one term or more than five years, whichever is greater, except by the unanimous consent of the entire executive committee. No more than two extensions of one year each may be granted. Multiple full or partial terms of a member on any particular committee, board, or organization may be served by the member if not less than one (1) fiscal year of the Association elapses between each full or partial term served.

ARTICLE X. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

The rules contained in the eleventh edition of *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised* shall govern this Association in all cases to which they are applicable and in which they are not inconsistent with these bylaws and any special rules of order the Association may adopt.

ARTICLE XI. DISSOLUTION

In the event of the dissolution of the Association, the Association shall distribute any assets remaining after the discharge of all liabilities, for charitable, scientific, or educational purposes in strict compliance with exemption provided under Section 501(c)(6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986. Any such assets not so disposed of shall be disposed of by a court of competent jurisdiction for the county in which the principal office of the Corporation is then located, exclusively for such purposes or to such organization or organizations as said court shall determine, which are organized and operated exclusively for such purposes. It is recognized that, under these

circumstances, no member of the Association shall have any right or interest in or to the property or assets of the Association.

ARTICLE XII. AMENDMENTS

SECTION 1. Proposal of Amendments

A. Amendments to Article I, Article II, the AAPG Code of Ethics or this section shall be subject to the following requirements:

1. Amendments may be proposed by the executive committee, the house of delegates, a special committee appointed by the president, or by petition of any fifty Members of AAPG. All proposed amendments shall be reviewed for legality by the executive committee with advice of counsel, and shall be published in the Bulletin or by other suitable means at least two months prior to the annual meeting of the house of delegates.

2. The house of delegates shall consider such amendments at its annual meeting, and a majority vote shall be required to send the ballot to the Members. If the house of delegates amends the proposal, the executive committee shall review the amended proposal for legality prior to such ballot being sent.

3. Ballots shall be sent to the Members no later than sixty days after the annual meeting of the house of delegates. A two thirds vote of the ballots received shall be required for amendment of Article I, Article II, or the AAPG Code of Ethics.

B. Amendments to all other articles of these bylaws or to the disciplinary code shall be subject to the following requirements:

1. Amendments may be proposed by the executive committee, the house of delegates, by petition of any fifty Members of AAPG, or by a majority vote of the officers of the house of delegates plus the chair of the bylaws committee. All proposed amendments shall be sent to the chair of the house of delegates, who shall forward them to the executive committee to be reviewed for legality with advice of counsel, and to the bylaws committee for review and report to the house.

2. Except for amendments proposed by house resolution, proposed amendments shall be sent within thirty days of receipt to the executive committee, members of the house of delegates, the bylaws committee, the advisory council, and any committee or member(s) of the Association designated by the executive committee to receive them. All of the aforementioned groups may submit comments to the bylaws committee chair up to thirty days prior to the meeting of the house at which the proposed amendment is to be considered.

3. For amendments proposed by house resolution, the executive committee, members of the house of delegates, the bylaws committee, the advisory council, and any committee or member(s) of the Association designated by the executive committee to receive them may submit comments to the bylaws committee until October 31 following the adoption of the house resolution.

4. Proposed amendments shall be published in the *Bulletin* or by other suitable means at least ninety days prior to the annual meeting of the house of delegates. All comments received by the aforementioned deadlines shall be sent with the proposed amendments to the members of the house of delegates.

5. A two-thirds vote of those present and voting in the house of delegates shall be required to amend these bylaws.

ARTICLE XIII - FOUNDATION

This Association shall establish an autonomous Foundation as a permanent entity to receive contributions, invest same, and distribute funds for the purposes and provisions as stipulated in Article II of the Declaration of Trust Agreement dated April 4, 1967; provided, that the Foundation need not retain the trust

form of organization. The executive committee of the Association shall represent the Association's dealings with the Foundation.

APPENDIX A

AAPG CODE OF ETHICS

SECTION 1. General Principles

- a. Geology is a profession, and the privilege of professional practice requires professional morality and professional responsibility.
- b. Honesty, integrity, loyalty, fairness, impartiality, candor, fidelity to trust, and inviolability of confidence are incumbent upon every member as professional obligations.
- c. All members, regardless of classification, shall be guided by high standards of business ethics, personal honor, and professional conduct.

SECTION 2. Relation of Members to the Public

- a. Members shall not make false, misleading, or unwarranted statements, representations or claims in regard to professional matters, nor shall they engage in false or deceptive advertising
- b. Members shall not permit the publication or use of their reports or maps for any unsound or illegitimate undertakings.
- c. Members shall not give professional opinions, make reports or give legal testimony without being as thoroughly informed as reasonably required.

SECTION 3. Relation of Members to Employers and Clients

- a. Members shall disclose to prospective employers or clients the existence of any pertinent competitive or conflicting interests.
- b. Members shall not use or divulge any employer's or client's confidential information without their permission and shall avoid conflicts of interest that may arise from information gained during geological investigations.

SECTION 4. Relation of Members to One Another

- a. Members shall not falsely or maliciously attempt to injure the reputation or business of others.
- b. Members shall freely recognize the work done by others, avoid plagiarism, and avoid the acceptance of credit due others.
- c. Members shall endeavor to cooperate with others in the profession and shall encourage the ethical dissemination of geological knowledge.

SECTION 5. Duty to the Association

- a. Members of the Association shall aid in preventing the election to membership of those who are unqualified or do not meet the standards set forth in this code of ethics.
- b. By applying for or continuing membership in the Association each member agrees to uphold the ethical standards set forth in this code of ethics.
- c. Members shall not use AAPG membership to imply endorsement, recommendation, or approval by the Association of specific projects or proposals.

SECTION 6. Discipline for Violations of Standards

Members violating any standard prescribed in this article shall be subject to discipline as provided by the AAPG bylaws and disciplinary code.

APPENDIX B

DISCIPLINARY CODE

SECTION 1. Executive Committee Authority and Responsibility

Subject to the provisions of the AAPG bylaws, the executive committee shall have primary authority over matters of professional conduct and discipline. Unless otherwise provided by these bylaws, no member, committee, division, section, or region of the Association shall initiate or conduct any investigation or hearing or impose any sanction concerning the professional conduct of an Association member or applicant for Association membership. The executive committee shall adopt procedures governing the investigation, hearing, and disposition of charges of misconduct, and shall publish such procedures in the *Bulletin* or by other suitable means.

SECTION 2. Disciplinary Action

Members shall be subject to disciplinary action for: (a) violating the AAPG Code of Ethics, or (b) pleading guilty to a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or to any felony, admitting to the violation of any governmental statute, regulation, rule, or code of ethics relating to the practice of geology, or who, as determined by the executive committee, falsely stated qualifications for membership.

SECTION 3. Violations of the AAPG Code of Ethics

A. For violations of the AAPG Code of Ethics, charges shall first be submitted in writing to the executive director at Association headquarters, and shall include a statement of the evidence on which the charges are based. The executive director shall submit the charges to the ethics committee. If in the judgment of the ethics committee and after consultation with AAPG legal counsel, the evidence supports further action by the Association, the committee shall prepare and file formal charges with the advisory council at Association headquarters.

B. For violations of the AAPG Code of Ethics, and upon the notification of member actions or the filing of formal charges, the chair of the advisory council shall appoint a hearing body composed of five members of the advisory council, including at least one past president of the Association. The ethics committee shall appoint one of its members as the prosecutor. Both the prosecutor and the accused member may challenge such appointments and require removal of up to two members of the hearing body. Such removed members shall be replaced with other members of the advisory council selected by the chair of the advisory council. The hearing body shall set the time, date, and place for a hearing on the charges. The accused member shall be given such written notice at least thirty days prior to such date, mailed to the member by registered mail to the member's last-known mailing address. The notice shall also include a copy of the formal charges, the disciplinary code and any other adopted disciplinary procedures.

The accused member may appear with legal counsel before the hearing body, hear any witnesses called in support of the charges and, at the member's option, cross- examine the same, present witnesses in the member's behalf, and submit oral or written statements in the member's behalf. The prosecutor may likewise be represented by legal counsel, present witnesses, and cross-examine the accused member's witnesses. The hearing body may consult at any time with legal counsel of its choosing.

By registered letter addressed to the chair of the advisory council at Association headquarters and postmarked not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing, the accused member may, at his or her own option, waive personal appearance and request the hearing body to adjudge the matter on the basis of a written statement of the member's defense accompanying such letter. Failure of the accused member to appear or to submit a waiver letter and a written defense shall not prevent the hearing body from rendering final judgment.

SECTION 4. Other Violations

A. For disciplinary action resulting from pleading guilty to a misdemeanor involving moral turpitude or to any felony; admission to the violation of any governmental statute, regulation, rule, or code of ethics relating to the practice of geology; or a false statement of qualifications for membership; the executive committee shall set the time, date, and place for a hearing on the charges. The accused member shall be given such written notice at least thirty days prior to such date, mailed to the member by registered mail to the member's last-known mailing address. The notice shall also include a copy of the formal charges, the disciplinary code and any other adopted disciplinary procedures. As applicable, the notice shall also be accompanied by a copy of a court document or other official document indicating such plea of guilty or admission of violation, a copy of the judgment or other document indicating such conviction or finding, and a copy of any applicable order of an appellate court or other appellate body, or a statement explaining such charge of falsely stating qualifications of membership.

The accused member may appear with legal counsel before the executive committee, present written evidence to the executive committee, present witnesses in the member's behalf, and submit oral or written statements in the member's behalf.

The executive committee shall have the right to cross-examine the member and any witnesses presented by the member on the member's behalf. At the member's option, the member may, by registered letter addressed to the president of the Association at Association headquarters, postmarked not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of the hearing, request that the executive committee consider the matter on the basis of a written statement by the member accompanying such a letter without the personal appearance of the member. The executive committee shall consider such statements prior to voting on the suspension or expulsion of the member.

B. A member who does not plead guilty to but is convicted of the aforementioned offenses may be suspended from membership in the Association upon a majority vote of all members of the executive committee of the Association. If such a conviction or finding is reversed on appeal, the member shall be reinstated to membership. If such a conviction or finding is not appealed, or is upheld on final appeal, the member may be expelled from membership by a majority vote of all members of the executive committee, following a trial at which the executive committee shall serve as the hearing body. If such a conviction or finding is the subject of an executive pardon, the member shall be reinstated to membership upon a majority vote of all members of the executive committee of the Association.

SECTION 5. Disposition of Charges

A. After the conclusion of the hearing or study of the written defense submitted in lieu thereof, the hearing body shall consider and vote to sustain or dismiss the charges. A finding sustaining the charges shall require a four-fifths vote. Notice of the decision of the hearing body shall be sent by registered

mail to the accused member at the member's last-known post office mailing address.

If the charges are sustained, the hearing body may impose the following discipline:

- (a) issue a private or public admonition of the member; or
- (b) suspend the member for a stated period of time; or
- (c) allow the member to resign; or
- (d) expel the member.

B. Disposition of the charges on any terms or conditions may be made at any time prior to the conclusion of the proceedings, provided such disposition has been agreed to by all of the members of the ethics committee, the chair of the advisory council, the accused member, and the executive committee. The existence of allegations against any member and their basis and content shall be confidential.

SECTION 6. Appeals Procedure

Action taken by the hearing body may be appealed to the executive committee of the Association by either the accused member or the ethics committee within thirty (30) days of the date notice of the decision of the hearing body is sent to the accused member. The executive committee shall have final authority whether to sustain or order a rehearing on the decision of the hearing body.

SECTION 7. Resignation

Resignation by the accused member from the Association, at any stage in the foregoing prescribed proceedings, shall automatically terminate the proceedings. Following resignation, the accused person so resigning shall not be eligible for reinstatement to membership except by unanimous vote of all members of the executive committee of the Association.

SECTION 8. Expulsion

Persons expelled from the Association under these proceedings shall be ineligible for reinstatement to membership except by unanimous vote of all members of the executive committee of the Association.

SECTION 9. Publication of Grievance Matters

The executive director of the Association shall cause to be published annually in the Bulletin or by other suitable means a summary of all grievance proceedings initiated, pending, or considered each year. The summary shall include, but not be limited to, the general type of complaint, the level of grievance procedure attained, and status or disposition of the case. Names of parties shall not be published, except that the name of any member expelled from the Association shall be published in said summary.
